

ARCHITECTURAL DIVISION LETTER

Among the more common complaints filed each year against unlicensed individuals or firms are those involving the use of the terms “architect,” “architecture” and “architectural” alone or together in an individual’s title or the name of a firm. Section 327.091, RSMo, is the Missouri statute that is cited in the complaint

as the violation. The intent is to protect the public from unlicensed people claiming they are, or their firm is, qualified to practice architecture. Examples include people who claim the title “Project Architect” or “Architectural Designer” when they are not licensed as architects in Missouri. These are complaints the Board will pursue. However, we also receive complaints against people or firms using titles of “Software Architect,” “Technology Architect,” “IT Architecture” or other similar titles. Our investigation often finds that the person or firm in these cases is clearly providing a service that is not related to the design and construction of buildings. When this happens, there is no violation of the statute.

We need to remember that the term “architect” does not belong solely to our profession. There is a broader definition found in dictionaries that includes “the deviser, maker, or creator of anything or a person who designs and guides a plan, project, etc.” Chapter 327, RSMo, recognizes the possibility of other uses by stating that a violation occurs only when the use of the term “architect” or “architecture” “indicates or implies that



such person is or holds himself or herself out to be an architect.” Our rules further recognize in 20 CSR 2030-5.030(1) the title “architectural intern” as an acceptable term to be used by unlicensed architectural staff members who are participating in IDP through NCARB and have graduated with an NAAB-accredited degree.

Another source of violations involving misuse of the term “architect” is where complaints are brought against both unlicensed people and architects in the residential construction market. Section 327.101(5), RSMo, provides an exception that allows an unlicensed person to provide architectural services for single-family or two-family dwellings, flats and apartments. This exception is often misconstrued to mean that the statutes regulating the practice of architecture do not apply to residential construction. That is not true. Unlicensed people cannot use titles such as “Residential Architect” or “Residential Architectural Designer.” Furthermore, they are required to state clearly that they are not a licensed architect on all construction documents that they produce under this exception. A licensed architect cannot make such a declaration and must therefore comply with all aspects of Chapter 327 , RSMo, pertaining to the practice of architecture. The regulations do not change for a licensed architect regardless of whether the project is residential or otherwise.

A third common violation occurs when an architect licensed in another state presents him/herself to a client as an architect licensed in this state when, in fact, that person is not licensed in Missouri. Business cards often trigger this complaint when the person has a title on it that incorporates such terms as “Architect,” “Project Architect” or “Architectural Designer” when he or she is not licensed in Missouri. Remember, a person must be licensed in Missouri in order to “indicate or imply that such person is or holds himself or herself out to be an architect.”



PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING DIVISION LETTER

In the last newsletter, I asked the question, “Should we allow the Professional Engineering (PE) test to be taken early?” I have never received a response from as many people on any question as I did on this one. The results were pretty much the same as when National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying (NCEES) first discussed the proposal at the annual meeting. Our poll was 12 “yes” votes, 11 “no” votes, and 2 “indifferent” votes.

So where do we go from here? I believe the best course of action is to wait until after the next NCEES Annual Meeting, to see what other state boards have discussed with their licensees.

One of my main concerns is mobility, or the ability of Missouri PEs to become licensed in other states by comity, if the criteria for PE licensure in Missouri are different. Some states, like Missouri, require by statute “at least four years of satisfactory engineering experience, after such person has graduated” (327.221, RSMo) in order to apply to take the PE exam. This is in addition to the parts of the statute (327.241, RSMo) and rule (20 CSR 2030-5.080) I cited in the original article.

If a person takes and passes the PE test in another state which allows early testing, they currently do not automatically qualify for comity licensure in Missouri. Currently they must meet the criteria established by Missouri law at the time of their original licensure. Other states’ laws are similar.

Meeting in May and at the NCEES Annual Meeting in August. You will be well represented, and we will let you know the outcome of those discussions in later newsletters.

Legislation has been introduced this session (SB 809 and HB 1771) to update language in Chapter 327, RSMo, on the definitions of Architect, Professional Engineer, Professional Land Surveyor and Professional Landscape Architect as well as other general housekeeping items to make the wording more consistent throughout. In addition, new definitions were developed for “design coordination,” “design survey,” “incidental practice” and “responsible charge.” These terms have been used for years when describing activities we do as part of our profession, but until now did not have a definition spelled out in Chapter 327. New language clarifies and simplifies the steps the Board may use when a licensee fails to renew their license by the expiration date. Existing language has been modified on engineering and surveying examinations to allow for computer-based testing now in place for the Fundamentals of Engineering (FE) and Land Surveyor-in-Training exams (FS).

This brings me to another recurring question that has gained momentum again: Should Missouri license Structural Engineers (SE) separately from other Professional Engineers? Should Missouri offer the two-day, 16-hour SE exam given by NCEES knowing that, other than credit for taking the exam, those that pass it currently would only qualify for a PE license in Missouri, the same as those who take the traditional one-day, eight-hour PE exam?

I participated in a Structural Engineering Licensure Roundtable on January 23, 2014, in St. Louis, where all aspects of structural engineering licensure were discussed, including how it developed in the state of Washington. I believe that 11 boards currently offer some sort of SE licensure.

PROFESSIONAL LAND SURVEYING DIVISION LETTER

As many of you know, within our profession there are a multitude of diverse opinions with regard to the educational and experience needs of our fledgling prospective surveyors. In 2007, I began tracking the pass/fail rates of the various candidates seeking licensure. I looked at the number of applicants taking the Fundamentals of Surveying (FS), Principles and Practice of Surveying (PS) and state-specific exams trying to find a correlation between the pass/fail rates and our current 12-hour educational requirement. Basically, for the National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying (NCEES) exams, I found that Missouri candidates fared pretty much the same as candidates from other jurisdictions. Unfortunately, the same cannot be said for those taking the state-specific exam. If our current 12 hours of college-level surveying education is deemed to be sufficient to prepare our local surveyor applicants for the licensing exams, why are so many failing the state-specific portion? The simple answer is their surveying education and experience is inadequate. They need more formal education as well as better supervision and mentorship in their work experiences.

Each quarter, the Land Surveying Division of this Board reviews

complaints against surveyors. During our review, there seems to be a primary underlying issue: the surveyor does not know or understand boundary control and/or legal principles. In many cases, I question the quality of their surveying procedures. Our licensing statute, section 327.312(1), RSMo, states that surveying applicants must have “at least twelve semester hours of approved surveying course work as defined by board regulation of which at least two semester hours shall be in the legal aspects of boundary surveying.” Test failures and validated complaints are telling us that this minimum of two semester hours is not enough. How much is enough?

The Missouri Society of Professional Surveyors (MSPS) has caused bills to be introduced in the legislature that propose to increase the approved surveying coursework from 12 to 30 hours and increase the legal aspects of boundary surveying from two to six hours. The Land Surveying Division encourages the proposed changes as a tool to protect the public interest by properly educating our surveyors in locating private boundary lines and avoiding costly litigation and bad-will between neighbors.

If this legislation passes, it will result in better educated surveyors. If it doesn't pass, I highly recommend that our prospective surveyors educate themselves utilizing any of a number of readily available resources. There are several textbooks that guide surveyors in the application of proper procedures for boundary location based on evidence and solid legal principles. One of the first publications that confronted the legal aspects of surveying was published in 1922 by Frank Emerson Clark entitled *A Treatise on the Law of Surveying and Boundaries*. This book is intended to acquaint the surveyor with the principal legal problems that could confront him in his/her work.

One of my personal favorites is *Boundary Control and Legal*

Principles, first published in 1957 by Curtis Brown. There have been multiple updated editions by noted surveying experts. This book established the first “road map” to standardizing surveying practices and procedures.

In 1962, Mr. Brown and Winfield Eldridge published another staple for every surveyor's library, *Evidence and Procedures for Boundary Location*. There have also been multiple updated editions. The procedures noted in Mr. Brown's books are cited in numerous court decisions involving boundary disputes.

A new “must-have” book about Missouri's unique public land system was recently penned by longtime Rolla area surveyor and former member of this Board, Dr. Richard Elgin, PE, PLS, Ph.D. This book is titled *U.S. Public Land Survey System for Missouri*. It is a complete synthesis of Missouri's unique version of the United States Public Land Survey System (USPLSS) and examines Missouri court decisions concerning resurveys of the public lands system and the re-establishing of lost corners.

It is my opinion that if our new (and old) surveyors take advantage of the vast knowledge available in these – and other similar – publications, the evaluation of evidence and procedures will vastly improve and be a giant step forward in producing better practitioners.





LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURAL DIVISION LETTER

I have found that being an active member in the Council of Landscape Architectural Boards (CLARB) is a great networking tool and a great mechanism for finding what is going on both within the industry and with other state boards. As we get together and share information, I have learned that we share a lot of common victories and some of the same problems. I have also discovered that there can be some major differences between the boards. One

frequent topic of conversation revolves around individual and corporate renewal fees. When I mention to other states that our licensee renewal fee is \$35.00 for two years, questions typically follow as to how we can do it for such a small amount.

I did a little online spot checking of renewal fees of some of our surrounding states and was a little surprised as to the range of fees. In order from lowest to highest based on an annual cost, Missouri is \$35 for two years, Kansas is \$60 for two years, Illinois is \$30 for one year, Arkansas is \$100 for one year, Oklahoma is \$325 for two years and Nebraska \$170 for one year.

As most of you know, the Missouri Board is in great financial shape. There is no taxpayer money used to operate the Board. The only funding we have is generated from licensure and renewal fees. On a side note, civil penalties collected are returned to the school fund in the county in which the violation occurred. Our executive director, Judy Kempker, annually performs five-year financial models to assist in looking at revenue and expense forecasting. As a result of this analysis several years ago, individual license renewal fees were lowered to \$35.00 for a two-year renewal period, and recently, corporate fees were lowered from \$200 to \$100 for the same biennial period. All of

this was done with careful attention to managing expenses while maintaining a high level of service to our licensees and those we are charged to protect. The Board's budget request for FY15 is approximately \$1.3 million, the same as what was appropriated for FY14. Even with the reduction of fees and the improvement of services, the Board still maintains a healthy fund balance.

On a slightly different note, I am currently 18 months into my two-year term as the Region II Director for CLARB. CLARB has come so far in the 17 years since I first started attending meetings as a representative of Missouri. As an organization, they are not standing pat on past accomplishments but are looking into the future. The welfare research paper they recently developed was groundbreaking and will hopefully begin to be incorporated into state statutes in the near future. The staff and the Board of Directors rely heavily on the strategic plan for setting future direction. As such, CLARB has positioned itself to be an international model as well, with frequent contact from Asia, Europe and South America. It is not out of the question that CLARB membership will someday extend beyond the United States into Canada.

The deadline to file for another term was January 31. I did some considerable soul searching and looked at my current commitments and possible future commitments and made the difficult decision not to pursue an additional CLARB term. It has been a great experience, and I believe that CLARB is in very capable hands with former Missouri Board member Jerany Jackson currently serving as President-Elect.

As long as I continue to serve as a member of the Board, I ask that you please feel free to contact me if I can ever be of any service to you.





STATE-SPECIFIC LS EXAM COMMITTEE MEETS

The Missouri Board’s State Specific Land Surveying Exam Committee recently met on the campus of the Missouri University of Science & Technology in Rolla. Mike Freeman, Dan Govero, Mike Flowers, Darrell Pratte, Rich Howard, Bob Shotts, Chris Ferguson and Dick Elgin met to develop new questions for the 2 hour exam. The committee meets periodically to write new questions, to review the exam syllabus, to review the appropriateness of materials, and to discuss the exam content and length. “The Board appreciates the time and dedication of this group,” said Mike Freeman, PLS, Chairman of the Board’s Land Surveying Division.

The committee confirmed the Exam’s split format and set the following exam content goals for each exam part.

An applicant for licensure as a Professional Surveyor in Missouri must pass each part of the State Specific Exam, as well as the “Fundamentals of Surveying” and the “Principles and Practice of Surveying” exams prepared by NCEES.



NCEES LAUNCHES COMPUTER-BASED FE AND FS EXAMS

Those planning to take their Fundamentals of Engineering or Fundamentals of Surveying exams are now able to take them via computer. The National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying fully transitioned the FE and FS exams to computer-based testing as of Jan. 1, administered exclusively at approved Pearson VUE test centers. Computer-based testing provides many advantages for both examinees and NCEES. Test-takers are now able to schedule their exam any time that is convenient and receive results within 7 to 10 business days. 2014 LEGISLATION OF INTEREST

Legislation the Board is tracking for this year includes the following bills.

HOUSE BILLS

HB 1212 – This bill authorizes any political subdivision to enter into design-build contracts for construction projects exceeding one million dollars.

HB 1182 – This bill revises and updates statutory language and references. In its main provisions, the bill updates numerous intersectional references (104.342, 104.1024, 105.400, 105.430, 210.114, 288.036, 301.562, 324.028, 324.159, 326.265, 327.051, 329.025, 330.190, 332.041, 334.618, 335.036, 336.160, 338.130, 339.120, 345.035, and 414.412). This is more or less a cleanup bill. It proposes to change Section 327.051.2 to make reference to subsection 11 of Section 324.001 instead of subsection 10.

HB 1532 – This bill proposes to designate the third week of February as “Engineers Awareness Week” in the state of Missouri. The citizens of this state are encouraged to observe the week with appropriate activities and events to promote the engineering discipline to students, expand public recognition of the engineering profession, and celebrate engineering accomplishments.

HB 1660 – This bill allows third and fourth class counties to adopt building codes upon voter approval and exempts agricultural structures from building codes in those counties.

HB 1771 – This bill modifies provisions relating to licensure by the Board for Architects, Professional Engineers, Professional Land Surveyors and Professional Landscape Architects.


HB 1824 – This bill establishes guidelines for the regulation of occupations and professions not regulated by the Division of Professional Registration within the Department of Insurance, Financial Institutions and Professional Registration prior to January 1, 2015, and those regulated professions that seek to substantially increase their scope of practice. The bill specifies that an individual may engage in the occupation of his or her choice, free from unreasonable government regulation. The state may not impose a substantial burden on an individual’s pursuit of his or her occupation or profession unless there is a compelling interest for the state to protect the general welfare. Where an interest exists, the regulation adopted by the state should be the least restrictive type of regulation consistent with the public interest to be protected.

HB 1891 – This bill (also referred to as the “Deregulation Bill”) authorizes a person to engage in the practice of specified professions without being licensed if he or she does not hold himself or herself out as being licensed. (The profession of landscape architects is included in this bill.)

SENATE BILLS

SB 504 – This act provides that state agencies must make proposed rules available to the public by providing a web page which contains a summary, full text of the rule, and a fiscal note for each proposed rule, as well as a link to the Missouri Register. This information must be made available on the website the same day that the proposed rule is published in the Missouri Register.

SB 528 – Under current law, every application for a renewal of a professional license, certificate, registration, or permit must contain the applicant’s Social Security number. This act states that an application for a professional license renewal only has to include a Social Security



number in situations where the original application did not contain a Social Security number. After the initial application for license renewal which includes a Social Security number, an applicant is no longer required to provide a Social Security number in subsequent renewal applications.

SB 645 – Currently, certain information pertaining to a licensee or applicant under the Division of Professional Registration is treated as confidential and only disclosed with the person’s consent, pursuant to litigation or other lawful requests. This act allows the disclosure of applicant or licensee information when requested by members of the General Assembly or their employees. This act also provides that an executive director of a board or commission under the Division of Professional Registration can only serve in this capacity on one board or commission, or a combination of boards or commission with the total number of licensees under the authority of the various boards

is two-thousand or less. However, an executive director may serve on multiple boards if serving a different board personnel function.

SB 704 – This bill modifies the qualification requirements for enrolling as a land surveyor-in-training and proposes to increase the educational requirements for licensure as a Professional Land Surveyor.

SB 803 – This bill allows third and fourth class counties to adopt building codes upon voter approval and exempts agricultural structures from county building codes.

SB 809 – This bill modifies provisions of law regarding licensing of architects, professional engineers, professional land surveyors, and professional landscape architects.

RULE UPDATES

Two rule changes went into effect since the publication of our last newsletter. The affected rules are as follows:

- **Board Rule 20 CSR 2030-2.040**, which was formerly the Standard of Care rule. This rule was amended to change its title from Standard of Care to Evaluation Criteria for Building Design and to delete reference to Section 107; and,
- **Board Rule 20 CSR 2030-2.050**, Title Block. This rule was amended to delete reference to “other documents” and provide more clarity by listing the specific documents which shall contain a title block.

20 CSR 2030-2.040 Evaluation Criteria for Building Design

PURPOSE: This rule provides the recipient and producer of professional architectural, engineering, and/or landscape architectural services assurances that all services are evaluated in accordance with the 2012 edition of the International Building Code.

PUBLISHER’S NOTE: The secretary of state has determined that the publication of the entire text of the material which is incorporated by reference as a portion of this rule would be unduly cumbersome or expensive. This material as incorporated by reference in this rule shall

be maintained by the agency at its headquarters and shall be made available to the public for inspection and copying at no more than the actual cost of reproduction. This note applies only to the reference material. The entire text of the rule is printed here.

(1) For building design, the board shall use, in the absence of any local building code, the 2012 edition of the International Building Code, as the evaluation criteria in determining the appropriate conduct for any professional licensed or regulated by this chapter and being evaluated under section 327.441.2(5), RSMo. The International Code Council, 2012 Edition is incorporated herein by reference and may be obtained

20 CSR 2030-2.050 Title Block

PURPOSE: This rule clarifies the identity of the client and entity preparing and sealing all architectural, engineering, land surveying, and/or landscape architectural documents.

(1) An architectural, engineering, land surveying, or landscape architectural entity shall incorporate a title block on all drawings, exhibits, plans, plats, maps, and surveys that are required to be signed

and sealed by Chapter 327, RSMo, and these regulations.

- (2) The title block must, at a minimum, contain the following information:
 - (A) The name of the licensee either as a sole proprietor, partnership, corporation, limited liability company, or other appropriate entity;
 - (B) The licensee’s address and phone number;
 - (C) Name or identification of project;
 - (D) Address/location of project (city/county and state);
 - (E) Date prepared;
 - (F) Space for the licensee’s signature, date, and seal;
 - (G) The printed name, discipline, and license number of the person sealing the document; and
 - (H) The printed name, discipline, and certificate of authority number of the corporation as defined in section 327.011, RSMo.



**Dr. Paul R. Munger, PE
1932-2014**

Longtime Missouri Board Chair, Dr. Paul R. Munger, PE of Rolla, Missouri died at the age of 82 on April 19, 2014. Tapped by three different Missouri Governors, Paul had served on the Board three different times for a total of 17 years of service, 14 of which he served as Board Chair, a record. During this time he was involved with the investigation and subsequent disciplinary actions arising from the 1981 collapse of the Hyatt Regency Skywalks in Kansas City.

Paul received his BS and MS in civil engineering from Missouri S&T in 1958 and 1961, respectively. He earned his PhD from the University of Arkansas in 1972. He joined the Missouri S&T faculty in 1958 and retired as Professor in 2000. During some of those years he was Chairman of the Department of Civil Engineering. On retirement he became Professor Emeritus. As a faculty member, Paul taught a wide spectrum of civil engineering courses, served as faculty advisor to student organizations, advised both undergraduate and graduate students and influenced literally thousands of “Rolla Grads” in civil engineering. In the mid 1970s, Paul formed and was the Director of the Institute of River Studies. For the Corps of Engineers, his Institute conducted a multidisciplinary baseline study of the Missouri River from Rulo, Nebraska downstream to its mouth. This study combined science and engineering professors and student assistants from several universities.

Throughout his illustrious career Paul was an active participant in many technical/professional engineering societies and received awards from most of them for contributions to the engineering profession for which he cared so deeply. He became the national president of the National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying (NCEES); president of the civil engineering honor society, Chi Epsilon; president of the National Institute for Engineering Ethics and the charter president of the Council of Engineering & Scientific Specialty Boards. Paul received awards from those organizations as well as ASCE, NSPE and MSPE. He was a member of the Academy of Civil Engineers at both Missouri S&T and the University of Arkansas.

Paul will be missed by his family, friends, church, community, his beloved engineering profession and legions of former S&T civil engineering students.

UNLICENSED PRACTICE:

In 2013, the Board has had 14 complaints filed against individuals and 19 complaints filed against corporations which were charged with practicing architecture, professional engineering, land surveying and/or landscape architecture without being properly licensed. If an individual or corporation refuses to voluntarily cease and desist all illegal activities and to conduct all future activities in compliance with Chapter 327 RSMo, then the Board can request the Attorney General’s office to file suit in the appropriate circuit court seeking an injunction to restrain that individual or corporation from practicing architecture, professional engineering, professional land surveying and/or landscape architecture without a license. Another option the Board has is to refer the matter to the Attorney General’s Office to seek authority to assess a civil penalty. A civil penalty imposed under Section 327.077 RSMo can be as high as \$5,000 for each offense. However, each day of a continued violation constitutes a separate offense, with a maximum penalty of \$25,000. The Board assessed \$14,200 in civil penalties in 2013.

GUMERMAN, RICHARD J., PE-15710

Independence, Missouri

Summary: The Board received information that on or about July 25, 2013, Mr. Gumerman entered a plea of guilty in the United States District Court for the Western District of Missouri to one count of mail fraud and one count of filing a false income tax return. Mr. Gumerman was sentenced to concurrent sentences of 46 months on each count.

Cause for Discipline: Mr. Gumerman is subject to discipline by the Board pursuant to Sections 327.441.2(2) and 327.442, RSMo. Both statutes provide that a licensee is subject to discipline when the licensee has been adjudicated and found guilty, or entered a plea of guilty or nolo contendere, whether or not sentence is imposed, to certain crimes, including those to which Mr. Gumerman pled guilty.

Board Action: On January 28, 2014, the Board held a Disciplinary Hearing under Section 327.442, RSMo. Thereafter, the Board issued an Order revoking Mr. Gumerman’s Professional Engineering license number PE-15710. The Order became effective February 20, 2014.

PROBATIONS

LINDSEY, RAYBURN GALE, A-4903

Paragould, Arkansas

Summary: The Board received information that Mr. Lindsey is a licensed architect in the state of Arkansas; however, Mr. Lindsey has never been licensed in the state of Arkansas as a professional engineer. On September 29, 2009, Mr. Lindsey submitted a set of plans for code review to the City of Jonesboro, Arkansas for the construction of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Union Hall in which he signed and sealed all sheets of the plans including the engineering sheets. On April 6, 2012 the Arkansas Board determined that the signed and sealed engineering sheets by Mr. Lindsey were not the incidental practice of engineering by an architect and ordered him to pay a \$500 civil penalty for each count totaling a \$1000 civil penalty. Thereafter, on December 19, 2012, when Mr. Lindsey renewed his Missouri architectural license he did not report the Arkansas discipline.

Cause for Discipline: Cause exists for the Board to discipline Mr. Lindsey’s architectural license pursuant to Section 327.441.2(3), RSMo by use of fraud, deception, misrepresentation or bribery in securing any license or certificate of authority issued pursuant to this chapter or in obtaining permission to take any examination given or required pursuant to this chapter; Section 327.441.2(4), RSMo by obtaining or attempting to obtain any fee, charge, tuition or other compensation by fraud, deception or misrepresentation; Section 327.441.2(5), RSMo by incompetency, misconduct, gross negligence, fraud, misrepresentation or dishonesty in the performance of the functions or duties of any profession licensed or regulated by this chapter; Section 327.441.2(6) by violation of, or assisting or enabling any person to violate, any





provision of this chapter, or of any lawful rule or regulation adopted pursuant to this chapter; and, Section 327.441.2(10), RSMo by assisting or enabling any person to practice or offer to practice any profession licensed or regulated by this chapter who is not licensed and currently eligible to practice pursuant to this chapter.

Board Action: The Board authorized the Missouri Attorney General’s Office to proceed with settlement. Thereafter, Mr. Lindsey signed a Settlement Agreement with the Board agreeing to place his architectural license, number A-4903, on probation for a period of one year commencing on November 30, 2013 and ending on November 29, 2014.

HOFFMAN, STEPHEN CLEMENT, PE-23437

Paragon, Indiana

Summary: The Board received information that Mr. Hoffman’s professional engineering license had been disciplined in the states of Alabama, South Carolina, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Minnesota, and Tennessee. On January 29, 2013, the Board referred this matter to the Missouri Attorney General’s Office for the filing of a complaint with the Administrative Hearing Commission based on the disciplinary actions taken by the states of Alabama, South Carolina, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Minnesota, and Tennessee against Mr. Hoffman.

Cause for Discipline: Cause exists for the Board to discipline Mr. Hoffman’s professional engineering license pursuant to Section 327.441.2(5), RSMo by incompetency, misconduct, gross negligence, fraud, misrepresentation or dishonesty in the performance of the functions or duties of any profession licensed or regulated by this chapter; and, Section 327.441.2(8), RSMo by disciplinary action against the holder of a license or a certificate of authority, or other right to practice any profession regulated by this chapter granted by another state, territory, federal agency or country upon grounds for which revocation or suspension is authorized in this state.

Board Action: The Board authorized the Missouri Attorney General’s Office to proceed with settlement. Thereafter, Mr. Hoffman signed a Settlement Agreement with the Board agreeing to place his professional engineering license, number PE-23437, on probation for a period of one year commencing on February 14, 2014 and ending on February 13, 2015.

MASLAN, STEPHEN P., PE-20397

Kansas City, Missouri

Summary: As previously reported, Mr. Maslan signed a Settlement Agreement with the Board on October 13, 2009, under which he agreed that his professional engineering license would be on probation for a period of five (5) years commencing on November 6, 2009 and ending on November 5, 2014. As a part of the Settlement Agreement, Mr. Maslan must timely renew all licenses, timely pay all fees required for license renewal, and comply with all other requirements necessary to maintain his license in a current and active state. Also, as part of the Settlement Agreement, Mr. Maslan was to comply with all provisions of Chapter 327, RSMo, as amended; all rules and regulations of the Board; and all local, state, and federal laws. “State” as used in the Settlement Agreement refers to the state of Missouri and all other states of the United States. The terms of the Settlement Agreement required Mr. Maslan to renew his license by December 31, 2012. However, Mr. Maslan did not renew his license by December 31, 2012. By failing to renew his license when due, Mr. Maslan violated Section 2(C) of the Settlement Agreement, and is subject to additional discipline. On July 7, 2012, the Kansas State Board of Technical Professionals rendered a Final Order imposing discipline on Mr. Maslan. The Final Order resulted from a complaint by Roger Williams, Fire Marshal of the City of Salina, Kansas, alleging that Mr. Maslan had committed misconduct in the design, preparation, and sealing of plans for fire alarm systems on two projects in the City of Salina, which were for the Revolution Church and Big Lots. The imposition of the discipline in Kansas for conduct which would also





be cause for discipline in Missouri provides cause for discipline of Mr. Maslan’s Missouri professional engineering license.

Cause for Discipline: The Board may impose additional discipline on Mr. Maslan’s professional engineering license, number PE-20397, due to the provisions of Section 327.441.2(8), which states: disciplinary action against the holder of a license or a certificate of authority, or other right to practice any profession regulated by this chapter granted by another state, territory, federal agency or country upon grounds for which revocation or suspension is authorized in this state. Also, Mr. Maslan is subject to additional discipline because he violated Section 2(C) of the Settlement Agreement by failing to renew his license when due.

Board Action: The Board held a probation violation hearing on January 28, 2014. Thereafter, the Board issued an Order revoking Mr. Maslan’s professional engineering license number PE-20397. However, the Board stayed the revocation of Mr. Maslan’s professional engineering license, number PE-20397, and placed it on probation for a period of five years commencing on February 24, 2014 and ending on February 23, 2019. In addition, Mr. Maslan may only practice professional engineering in the areas of demonstrated competence, which the Board has determined are only structural and civil engineering.

CIVIL PENALTIES

FINE, ROBERT L. II, PE-26059 (EXPIRED 12-31-2001)

FINEnvironmental, Inc. (not licensed)

Shawnee, Kansas

Summary: The Board received information that on May 2, 1995, Robert L. Fine, II registered FINEnvironmental, Inc. with the Missouri Secretary of State as a Missouri corporation. The specific purpose of FINEnvironmental, Inc.’s business, as stated in the original articles of incorporation, was “To provide engineering and consulting services to public and private entities.” By incorporating and stating its purpose of providing engineering services, Mr. Fine and FINEnvironmental, Inc. were obligated to obtain an engineering certificate of authority from the Board. Thereafter on August 12, 2013, Mr. Fine amended FINEnvironmental, Inc.’s articles of incorporation to remove the stated purpose of providing engineering services. From May 2, 1995 until August 12, 2013, FINEnvironmental, Inc. held itself out as willing or able to render professional engineering services by filing numerous engineering reports under the organizational heading, implying that FINEnvironmental, Inc. was holding itself out to be a professional engineering firm. Therefore, Mr. Fine and FINEnvironmental, Inc. practiced professional engineering without a certificate of authority. Mr. Fine has not held a valid license to practice as an engineer in the state of Missouri since his failure to renew his Missouri license effective January 1, 2001. From May 2, 1995 until August 12, 2013, Mr. Fine held himself out as willing or able to render professional engineering services by filing numerous engineering reports under FINEnvironmental, Inc.’s letterhead, relying on his license which had expired December 31, 2001. Mr. Fine maintained a professional website at the business networking site LinkedIn.com. On his LinkedIn site, Mr. Fine described the business of FINEnvironmental, Inc. as: Chemical & environmental consulting engineering. Professional services include: due diligence property assessments; regulatory compliance audits; soil and groundwater remediation; hydrogeological/aquifer testing; groundwater treatment system design; expert testimony and litigation support. Mr. Fine listed his Missouri professional engineer license number PE-26059, under “honors and awards,” with no indication that his license has been expired since 2001. By describing the nature of his business as “chemical and environmental consulting engineering” and listing his Missouri professional engineer license, Mr. Fine offered and held himself out as willing and able to perform professional engineering services in the state of Missouri, which constitutes the practice of professional engineering in Missouri.

Cause for Discipline: Robert L. Fine, II and FINEnvironmental, Inc.’s conduct, as stated above, provides the Board cause to impose discipline





pursuant to Section 327.441.2(4), RSMo by obtaining or attempting to obtain any fee, charge, tuition or other compensation by fraud, deception or misrepresentation; Section 327.441.2(5), RSMo by incompetency, misconduct, gross negligence, fraud, misrepresentation or dishonesty in the performance of the functions or duties of any profession licensed or regulated by this chapter; Section 327.441.2(6), RSMo by violation of, or assisting or enabling any person to violate, any provision of this chapter, or of any lawful rule or regulation adopted pursuant to this chapter; and, Section 327.441.2(13), RSMo by violation of any professional trust or confidence.

Board Action: On November 25, 2013, in a Joint Motion for Consent Order, Joint Stipulation of Facts and Conclusions of Law, Waiver of Hearings before the Administrative Hearing Commission and the Missouri Board for Architects, Professional Engineers, Professional Land Surveyors, and Landscape Architects, and Disciplinary Order, Robert L. Fine, II and FINEnvironmental, Inc. jointly and severally agreed to pay \$10,000 in civil penalties, which shall be handled in accordance with the provisions of section 7 of article IX of the Missouri Constitution. In determining the amount the Board decided to impose on Robert L. Fine, II and FINEnvironmental, Inc., it considered the deterrent affect the penalty would have, the circumstances that led to the violations, the severity of the violation and risk to the public, the economic benefits gained by Robert L. Fine, II and FINEnvironmental, Inc., and the interests to the public. Within 60 days of the date of the Order, Robert L. Fine, II and FINEnvironmental, Inc. shall issue a cashier’s check or money order in the amount of \$10,000 made payable to Eric Peters, Cole County Treasurer, Cole County, Missouri, for payment to the county school fund. On or about December 2, 2013, the Board received a cashier’s check in the amount of \$10,000 for the civil penalties from Robert L. Fine, II and FINEnvironmental, Inc. On December 2, 2013, the Board mailed the \$10,000 cashier’s check to Eric Peters, Cole County Treasurer, Cole County, Missouri, for payment to the county school fund. In addition, Robert L. Fine, II and FINEnvironmental, Inc. shall cease and desist all professional engineering activity and advertisement performed in or related to properties located in the state of Missouri unless and until such time as Mr. Fine obtains relicensure of his professional engineer’s license and FINEnvironmental, Inc. obtains a corporate certificate of authority to practice professional engineering from the Board.

WATERMARK CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT SERVICES, LLC (NOT LICENSED)

Branson, Missouri

Summary: On May 1, 2012, the Board discovered that Watermark Construction Management Services, LLC, was practicing architecture and engineering without a license and/or corporate certificates of authority as they designed and constructed the renovation of Panda House restaurant located at 2130 Highway 248, Branson, Missouri. The Board referred the complaint case to the Missouri Attorney General’s office for the filing of a complaint with the Administrative Hearing Commission seeking a civil penalty for practicing architecture and engineering without corporate certificates of authority.

Cause for Discipline: Watermark Construction Management Services, LLC’s conduct, as stated above, provides the Board cause to impose discipline pursuant to Section 327.441.2(5), RSMo by incompetency, misconduct, gross negligence, fraud, misrepresentation or dishonesty in the performance of the functions or duties of any profession licensed or regulated by this chapter; Section 327.441.2(6), RSMo by violation of, or assisting or enabling any person to violate, any provision of this chapter, or of any lawful rule or regulation adopted pursuant to this chapter; and, Section 327.441.2(10), RSMo by assisting or enabling any person to practice or offer to practice any profession licensed or regulated by this chapter who is not licensed and currently eligible to practice pursuant to this chapter.

Board Action: The Board authorized the Missouri Attorney General’s Office to proceed with settlement. Thereafter, on February 27, 2014, Watermark Construction Management Services, LLC entered into a Settlement Agreement with the Missouri Board for Architects, Professional Engineers, Professional Land Surveyors, and Landscape Architects. In the Settlement Agreement, Watermark Construction Management Services, LLC agreed to pay \$2,000 in civil penalties, which shall be handled in accordance with the provisions of section 7 of article IX of





the Missouri Constitution. In determining the amount the Board decided to impose on Watermark Construction Management Services, LLC, it considered the deterrent affect the penalty would have, the circumstances that led to the violations, the severity of the violation and risk to the public, the economic benefits gained by Watermark Construction Management Services, LLC, and the interests to the public. Watermark Construction Management Services, LLC shall issue a cashier's check or money order in the amount of \$2,000 made payable to Melanie Smith, Taney County Treasurer, Taney County, Missouri, for payment to the county school fund. On or about February 27, 2014, the Board received a cashier's check in the amount of \$2,000 for the civil penalties from Watermark Construction Management Services, LLC. On February 27, 2014, the Board mailed the \$2,000 cashier's check to Melanie Smith, Taney County Treasurer, Taney County, Missouri, for payment to the county school fund. In addition, Watermark Construction Management Services, LLC shall cease and desist all licensed activity governed by Chapter 327 until such time as Watermark Construction Management Services, LLC is able to gain licensure.

PROBATED CERTIFICATES OF AUTHORITY AND CIVIL PENALTY

DICKMAN PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING SERVICES, LLC, E-2014005269

Osage Beach, Missouri

Summary: The Board received a complaint alleging that from at least January 14, 2003 until February 13, 2014, Dickman Professional Engineering Services, LLC offered and provided professional engineering services without having obtained a certificate of authority from the Board to offer or provide such services by incorporating in Missouri with as part of its statement of purposes to provide "Engeneering (sic) services to the general public", and by actually providing such services without having a corporate certificate of authority to do so.
