Assistant Physician – SB716

SB716 was passed by the 97th General Assembly and became effective August 28, 2014. This bill created a licensure category for assistant physicians (APs) in the State of Missouri. The bill also granted the Board authority to promulgate rules in conjunction with deans of medical schools and primary care residency program directors in the state. Specific rulemaking is limited to the development and implementation of educational methods and programs undertaken during the collaborative practice service to facilitate the advancement of the assistant physician's medical knowledge and capabilities, which may lead to credit toward a future residency program for programs. Those in attendance discussed options for documented education achievements that would be acceptable for assistant

physicians to obtain credit for future residency programs. Based on suggestions from those in attendance, staff will prepare a draft rule for the Board to review at their May 15, 2014 meeting.
