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PHILOSOPHY FROM FLO  
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At the recent meeting of the American Nurses' Association House of Delegates in Kansas City, there was much discussion with resultant recommendations in regard to the shortage of nurses. There are some who say it is current, very real and of a somewhat different character than the shortages previously experienced by the employers and clients of nursing services. Observations and recommendations will continue to be expressed for as long as there is a shortage. As long as there is discomfort for all concerned, including the profession itself, it will be treated as any other issue with many theories being expressed, a few solutions offered which will be accepted by some and at the same time there will be much questioning of each other. Other health care professionals will also offer solutions and recommendations, as occurs in our profession any time there is an issue. Nursing interfaces so closely with all other health care professions that some apparently feel the need and that they have the right to influence the direction of the development of our profession.

When the nursing shortage is addressed, one contributing factor frequently mentioned is the idea that nursing has a less than desirable image in society. In explaining the reasons why that may be true, television and news media are mentioned along with a general lack of knowledge in society regarding the role of nurses. Nurses are portrayed many times as irresponsible, immature, thoughtless females who are at the mercy of a wildly fluctuating flow of hormones and who act on impulse alone rather than acting upon intelligent, informed decisions.

In the past, I have been rather accepting of the idea that the media is willfully portraying nurses in such a manner without due cause. I have justified it to myself as pure fictionalizing for the purpose of increasing viewer ratings. I am less likely to accept that view point in the future and I ask you, as concerned members of the profession, to consider my following account of events at the past July, 1987 NCLEX-RN administration.

Carol and I were acting as Chief Examiners at the University Plaza Hotel/Trade Center in Springfield when the management of the hotel informed us they were showing extreme deficits in the linen supply. The deficits were severe enough that the hotel maids were experiencing difficulties in supplying clean linens to some of the guests. After further questioning it was discovered that the same hotel had experienced a loss of about 1,000 towels during last year's exam but had not mentioned it to us until this year's deficit reached even larger portions. The loss last year included not just bath towels, but also blankets, sheets, washcloths, hand towels and bath mats. The estimated cost of last year's loss was quoted to be around \$2,323.00 for just towels alone. The management also informed us they had become disturbed last July when examinees dropped cups of ice from balconies in the hotel's atrium onto the heads of people below.

While Carol and I were considering the appropriate approach to the linen situation, it was discovered that someone had poured shampoo into the 16-foot waterfall in the hotel's atrium which immediately bubbled up and clogged the filter system. The management by this time was rightfully quite angry with "the nurses."

The most appropriate approach seemed to be to confront the examinees as soon as possible in order to give everyone time to return linens and to give the person who put shampoo in the waterfall the opportunity to confess and offer to make restitution. Carol and I addressed the issue at the beginning of the second day of exams and by afternoon, an estimated 90% of the linens had been returned and the final count showed there was no greater loss than would normally be experienced for a full house. Someone also called the hotel management with the name of the "mad-bubble-maker."

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PHILOSOPHY FROM FLO, cont.  
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My point in relating these events is to say that the incidents may be smiled at by some, excused away as pranks and/or ignored by others. However, there are pranks and then there are also pranks! I submit that when you are participating in an activity which is seen to be representative of a group, in this case the nursing community, then the behavior of all must be reflective of what is expected of that group by society. The incidents at the exam site are the behaviors of which I was aware. There are likely to be others of which I am unaware. A television reporter and cameraman were at the site and did cover the examination as a news item.

The present controversies, one of which is the nursing shortage, draw attention to the profession and we are consequently under close scrutiny; the profession is living in a gold fish bowl. Could it be that the media portrays the behavior they actually see being exhibited?

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COMMENTS FROM CAROL  
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For as long as I can remember, the nursing literature has contained articles concerning the conflicts between nursing education and nursing service. We are currently experiencing such a conflict in Missouri as the intense competition for clinical facilities for student clinical experience escalates.

IT IS A FACT THAT ...

traditional acute hospital patient census has steadily declined. There are simply less patients to go around.

IT IS A FACT THAT ...

there is less competition for clinical facilities on evenings, weekends and nights, however, most schools are not utilizing these options.

IT IS A FACT THAT ...

many hospitals have had unsatisfactory cooperative agreements with schools in the past.

IT IS A FACT THAT ...

many times it causes increased workload on the nursing staff to have students in the clinical area.

IT IS A FACT THAT ...

nursing students in the clinical area may put a hospital at increased risk of error and resultant liability.

IT IS A FACT THAT ...

nursing students take up premium space at many times already overcrowded nursing stations or medication administration carts.

IT IS A FACT THAT ...

clinical facilities have little, if any control, over the appearance and conduct of students.

IT IS A FACT THAT ...

some clinical facilities are no longer hiring the graduates of certain types of programs who wish to affiliate with their institutions.

IT IS ALSO A FACT THAT ...

there continues to be many valuable learning experiences available in the acute hospital today.

IT IS ALSO A FACT THAT ...

as the sophistication of nursing technology increases, there exists a resultant need to increase the support courses in a nursing curriculum. These courses, if offered in institutions of higher learning, almost always conflict with the scheduling of full day and/or evening clinical rotations.

IT IS ALSO A FACT THAT ...

today's nursing student bears little resemblance to those of past years. Nursing students are older. They are often single parents who are the sole support of a household. They are very often employed in excess of twenty hours per week; many are employed full time, as well as going to school full time. They are most often paying for their tuition with savings or loans or pay-as-you-go plans. Many are economically disadvantaged. Therefore, their evenings, nights and weekends are consumed by working, studying and caring for their families. Very rarely is Daddy paying for the trip.

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COMMENTS FROM CAROL, cont.  
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IT IS ALSO A FACT THAT ...

we cannot afford to perpetuate old grudges if nursing is to remain a viable profession. Burying hatchets, starting over and reaching consensus must be the order of the day.

IT IS ALSO A FACT THAT ...

before you can be a staff nurse you had to first be a student. We have all asked annoying questions, made unfounded statements, spoken without full knowledge, questioned medication interactions until the staff could scream, and generally gotten underfoot. I can still remember being stopped by a staff nurse just before putting my patient, who was in Buck's tradition, into a wheelchair at the side of the bed. "But it says 'chair tid on the Kardex' I insisted." And to this day, I still remember her patience and kindness. And I learned.

The Missouri State Board of Nursing in the Minimum Standards for Schools of Nursing states that preference in clinical sites shall be given to schools with existing cooperative agreements. The Board cannot mandate that these facilities comply with this preference policy. The key word is COOPERATIVE agreement. If we are to deal with nursing shortage issues, lack of access to care issues and the establishment of nursing as a legitimate profession, we are going to have to come to terms with this basic issue first. If nursing service wants nursing education to produce graduates who are employable, then those graduates must have access to clinical facilities which provide them with learning experiences which exemplify nursing excellence when they are students. Each "side" has legitimate opinions based on past experiences. However, in a debate between NURSING education and NURSING service, the unifying concept is NURSING. This is the time for creative approaches to a problem which affects all of nursing. I invite dialogue and action plans for how we can address this critical issue.

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COMPUTER TESTING INFORMATION  
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National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Incorporated, continues to work on computer adaptive testings (CAT) as a means of administering NCLEX examinations.

We can look forward to that in the future.

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PROPOSED RULE AND RULE CHANGES  
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The following is a reproduction of the proposed rule, 4 CSR 200-4.040 Mandatory Reporting Rule, and proposed rule changes, 4 CSR 200-6.010 Intravenous Fluid Treatment Administration and 4CSR 200-2.040 Requirements for Licensure as they will appear in the September 1, 1987 Missouri Register:

Title 4 - DEPARTMENT OF  
ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Division 200 - State Board of Nursing

Chapter 4 - General Rules

PROPOSED RULE

4 CSR 200-4.040 Mandatory Reporting Rule

PURPOSE: To establish a procedure and guidelines regarding reports required from hospitals or ambulatory surgical centers by section 383.133, RSMo concerning any final disciplinary action against a nurse licensed under chapter 335 or the voluntary resignation of any such nurse.

(1) The Board of Nursing shall receive and process any report from a hospital or ambulatory surgical center concerning any final disciplinary action against a nurse licensed under chapter 335 or the voluntary resignation of any such nurse against whom any complaints or reports have been made which might have led to disciplinary action.

(2) Reports to the board shall be in writing and shall comply with the minimum requirements as set forth in section 383.133.2 and this rule. Such information shall include, but not be limited to:

(A) The name, address and telephone number of the person making the report;

(B) The name, address and telephone number of the person who is the subject of the report;

(C) A brief description of the facts which gave rise to the issuance of the report, including the dates of occurrence deemed to necessitate the filing of the report;

(D) If court action is involved and known to the reporting agent, the identity of the court, including the date of filing and the docket number of the action;

(E) A statement as to what final action was taken by the institution; and

(F) The Board of Nursing will assume that all reports received from hospitals or ambulatory surgical centers will be treated as under 383.133.

(3) The director of nursing, or person in a comparable position, shall report any actions as described in section (1) to the chief executive officer. Any activity that is construed to be a cause for disciplinary action according to section 335.066 shall be deemed reportable to the board. Nothing in this rule shall be construed as limiting or prohibiting any nurse from reporting a violation of the Nursing Practice Act directly to the State Board of Nursing.

(4) In cases where a nurse voluntarily submits to an employee assistance program or to a rehabilitation program for alcohol or drug impairment, this action is exempt from the reporting requirement provided that participation in the employee assistance program or rehabilitation program is a part of the nurse's contract with the nurse's current employer.

(5) In response to a written or verbal inquiry from a hospital or ambulatory surgical center regarding reports received by the board on a specific nurse the board shall provide the following information:

(A) Whether any reports have been received;

(B) The nature of each report; and

(C) The action which the board took on each report or if the board has taken action on the report.

(6) Each report received shall be acknowledged in writing. The acknowledgment shall state that the report is being reviewed by the board or is being investigated and shall be referred to the board or an appropriate board subcommittee for consideration. The institution shall subsequently be informed in writing as to whether the report has been dismissed by the board, or is being referred to legal counsel for filing with the Administrative Hearing Commission or for other legal action. The institution may be notified of the ultimate disposition of the report excluding judicial appeals.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

4 CSR 200-6.010 Intravenous Fluid Treatment Administration

PURPOSE: To assure accuracy of verification of intravenous therapy approval for Licensed Practical Nurses.

(6) (G) Records

1. The agency conducting the intravenous therapy course shall maintain the records of the individuals for a period of at least five (5) years and shall, within sixty (60) days, submit to the Missouri State Board of Nursing the names, addresses, date of completion and license numbers of all individuals who have successfully completed the program.

(7) (A) Review of the Missouri Nursing Practice Act, the current intravenous therapy rule, and the policies and procedures of the clinical agency where practical experience is received.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

4 CSR 200-4.020 Requirements for Licensure. The board is amending sections (1) - (12) and (14).

PURPOSE: To redefine requirements for licensure in the state of Missouri for registered professional nurses and licensed practical nurses by examination, endorsement and renewal.

(1) Examination.

(A) The registered professional nurse candidate shall have successfully completed the basic professional curriculum in an accredited school of nursing. The practical nurse candidate shall have successfully completed a basic prescribed curriculum in a state accredited school of practical nursing or completed a comparable period of training as determined by the board. A comparable period of training as that term is used in section 335.046.2, RSMo 1986) shall include the requirement that the practical nurse candidate has completed the comparable requirements for graduation {of} from a program which meets minimum standards for programs of practical nursing.

(B)3. Any applicant applying to write the practical nurse licensing examination {and} who is deficient in theory and/or clinical experience, as stated in the Minimum Standards for Practical Nursing, will {be required to enroll in an accredited program of practical nursing to complete the requirements necessary to write the licensing examination} not be allowed to write the examination.

(E) Applicants approved by the Missouri State Board of Nursing, as eligible to write the licensing examination for professional/practical nurses, shall be notified and forwarded identifying material and specific information as to date, time and place. Candidates shall write the current {Missouri State Board Licensing} National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Incorporated Licensure Examination for professional/practical nurses.

(F) {Applicants} An applicant for licensure by endorsement or licensure by examination who {do not meet Missouri's requirements shall be notified by the executive

director or the associate executive director. They shall also be notified that if they wish to discuss this decision with the members of the board, an appointment will be given for the next available board meeting} the executive director or the associate executive director determine may not meet the requirements for licensure or examination shall be notified that the applicant may meet with the board members to discuss the application at the board's next meeting or an appropriate subcommittee meeting if the applicant requests an appointment. The Missouri State Board of Nursing shall notify by certified mail, any individual who is refused permission to take an examination for licensure or an individual licensed in another state, territory or foreign country who is denied a license by endorsement without examination. At the time of notification, this individual is to be made aware of his/her avenue of appeal through the Missouri Administrative Hearing Commission.

(G) An applicant who has graduated from the peacetime Army Clinical Specialist Course; MOS; 91C20 (6-69) or the Air Force Medical Service Technician (Vocational Nurse) Course, Phase II, 3 AZR 90270-2 (11-70) which have been approved by the board, as comparable to the accredited {one (1)-year} programs offered in Missouri and have all qualifications as required by statute, shall be granted permission to write the examination for practical nurse licensure. Graduates from any of the Armed Services courses will be evaluated on an individual basis.

{(L) The registrant should record his/her license in a county clerk's office in order that a permanent record shall be on file. If verification of licensure in Missouri should be required, in lieu of the original license, the individual should contact the Missouri State Board of Nursing Office.}

(N) There shall be a thirty (30)-day grace period for graduates who have successfully passed the first available licensing examination following graduation to obtain a temporary permit license in Missouri after the graduate has received his/her results.:

## (2) Repeat Examination.

(A) A candidate with a score of less than the passing score determined by the Missouri State Board of Nursing

shall not qualify to receive a license to practice professional/practical nursing in Missouri. It shall be unlawful for any person to practice professional/practical nursing in Missouri after failure of the {State Board Test Pool} National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Incorporated Licensure Examination until successfully passing the examination and receiving a license.

{(C) Out-of-state failure candidates for original licensure in Missouri as a registered nurse who have previously written and passed only a portion of the State Board Test Pool Examination in another state or territory of the United States must successfully write all five (5) areas of the examination in Missouri for original Missouri licensure prior to July 1982. Candidates scheduled to write or rewrite a licensing examination, whether professional or practical, must write all parts of the test for which they have been scheduled and may not be granted permission to write part of the examination at one (1) time and the remainder the next time the examination is scheduled.}

(3) Passing Score.

(B) For the period March 1, 1954 through February 28, 1958, seventy percent (70%) was required for passing the practical nurse examination. For the period March 1, 1958 to December 31, 1958, the standard score of three hundred (300) was the minimum passing score for the practical nurse examination. As of January 1, 1959, the standard score of three hundred fifty (350) shall be the minimum passing score in Missouri for the State Board Test Pool licensing examination or the National Council Licensure Examination for practical nurses.

(4) Interstate Licensure by Endorsement in Missouri-Professional Registered Nurses and Licensed Practical Nurses.

(A) A professional/practical nurse licensed in another state or territory of the United States or Canada shall be entitled to licensure provided qualifications are equivalent to the requirements of Missouri at the time of {graduation} original licensure. Such equivalency shall be defined as -

1. Evidence of completion of a program of professional/practical nursing meeting the requirements of

Missouri in instruction and clinical laboratory experience; {required at the time of graduation}

2. Attainment of a passing score as determined by the Missouri State Board of Nursing {in each of the examination subjects of} on the licensing examination or attainment of an acceptable grade in areas comparable to those required in Missouri at the time licensure was secured in the state of original licensure;

3. Evidence of completion of the applicable secondary educational requirements set forth in section 335.046, RSMo, or the equivalent as determined by the State Department of Education; {and/or college credits}

6. If an individual was licensed by waiver as a practical/vocational nurse in another state, territory, or foreign country prior to July 1, 1955 and the individual meets the requirements for licensure as a practical nurse in Missouri which were in effect at the time the individual was licensed in the other jurisdiction, he/she is eligible for licensure in Missouri as a licensed practical nurse. If an individual is licensed by waiver in another state after July 1, 1955, he/she does not qualify for licensure by waiver in Missouri as a practical nurse; and

7. An individual licensed as a practical nurse by equivalency in another state or on the basis of attending an accredited program of professional nursing must submit a copy of {the school of} any and all nursing transcripts and all other educational information on which original licensure was based to the board of nursing office for evaluation as an equivalent candidate. If current minimum requirements are met, the individual must write and attain a passing score on the {State Board Test Pool Examination} National Council Licensure Examination if he/she has not already done so for licensure in another state.

(B) Procedure for Application.

2. The application for interstate licensure shall be completed in black ink {or typewritten,} with the affidavit portion properly executed before a notary public, accompanied by {two (2),} a two inch by two inch (2" x 2") portrait/photograph{s} of the applicant and the required fee which is nonrefundable. The application shall be submitted to the Missouri State Board of Nursing.

4. The applicant shall {be asked to request a} cause an official nursing transcript to be forwarded directly to the Missouri State Board of Nursing office if a

transcript is {needed to determine eligibility for licensure in Missouri} requested by the executive director or associate executive director.

(5) Applicants Not Meeting Requirements.

(B) An applicant who has not attained the passing score or grade on the licensing examination as required by the Missouri State Board of Nursing at the time of {graduation} original licensure shall be required to write the current Missouri state board licensing examination and receive a satisfactory score prior to licensure.

(C) A professional/practical nurse licensed in another state or territory of the United States shall be entitled to licensure, provided qualifications are equivalent to the requirements in Missouri at the time of {graduation} original licensure.

(6) Canadian Nurses' Association Testing Service (CNATS). The Missouri State Board of Nursing recognizes the CNATS examination and nurses who have successfully passed this examination shall be granted professional registered nurse licensure by endorsement providing they meet the minimal educational requirements in Missouri in effect at {that time} the time of original licensure.

(7) Temporary Permit. Applicants wishing to practice professional/practical nursing in Missouri following the evaluation of the application should submit a written request to the executive director of the Missouri State Board of Nursing and a copy of a current license from another state, {or} territory or Canada. {or country} A temporary permit may be secured for a limited period of time until the completed endorsement/{certification} verification of licensure form has been received from the state or territory of original licensure by examination and reviewed in the Missouri State Board of Nursing office.

(8) Intercountry Licensure by Examination in Missouri - Professional Registered Nurse and Practical Nurse.

(A) Application Procedure.

1. A professional/practical nurse licensed outside of the United States or Canada shall be entitled to apply to write the examination for licensure, if in the opinion of the Missouri State Board of Nursing, current requirements

for licensure in Missouri are met. All graduates of schools of nursing outside of the United States or Canada applying to take the licensing examination for registered professional nursing shall submit evidence of certification by the Commission on Graduates of Foreign Nursing Schools (CGFNS). This certification must signify a passing grade on the CGFNS English language and nursing practice proficiency examination as evidence of meeting similar qualifications of graduates of nursing programs in Missouri for the purpose of qualifying for admission to the state licensing examination.

2. An applicant {should} must request in writing, an Application for Professional/Practical Nurse Licensure by Examination. The request shall include the applicant's full name, current mailing address, and country {or} of original licensure. The application shall be properly executed by the applicant in black ink {or typewritten} and shall be included in the documents submitted to the Missouri State Board of Nursing for evaluation with the required credentials. All original documents shall be returned to the applicant. Credentials in a foreign language shall be translated into English, {notarized by an authorized individual, and attached} the translation shall be signed by the translator and the signature shall be notarized by a notary public. The translation shall be attached to the credentials in a foreign language when submitted to the Missouri State Board of Nursing.

3. The required credentials are -

A. Photostatic copy of high school {diploma and high school} transcript (transcript must list courses completed, length of courses, grades attained and dates of enrollment) for practical nurse applicants only;

D. Photostatic copy of school of nursing diploma/degree(s) for practical nurse applicants only;

E. Photostatic copy of school of nursing transcript listing the dates of enrollment in and completion of the program, the total number of hours of instruction and total number of days or weeks of clinical laboratory experience, completed in all areas during the program for practical nurse applicants only;

G. TOEFL {or CGFNS} certificate indicating successful completion of examination for practical nurse applicants only{:}.

{(I) Commission on graduates of foreign Nursing Schools (CGFNS) is a test of proficiency in nursing and language. This test is written prior to receiving a

professional/practical working visa. If this test is written and a certificate is given to the applicant, the TOEFL test may be waived; and)

{(II)} Foreign practical nurse applicants from non-English speaking countries or from English speaking countries with different native language shall be required to take the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) and attain a minimum score of fifty (50) in each section. When the applicant achieves a score of fifty (50) in each section of the test, the board of nursing will not address itself to that section should there be a required repeat of the examination for other sections;

4. The completed examination application with the required examination fee, two (2), two inch by two inch (2" x 2") portraits/photograph.BD.s of the applicant and the credentials outlined in previous paragraph (8)(A)3., shall be submitted to the Missouri State Board of Nursing.

(9) Guidelines for Evaluating Inter-country Transcripts.

(A) An applicant who has secured original licensure outside of the United States and has been licensed in another state, territory, or Canada by {writing the State Board Test Pool} examination may be licensed in Missouri. {by the following steps:}

{1. Requesting an application for endorsement indicating that he/she has been licensed in another country and has written the State Board Test Pool Examination for licensure in another state; and}

{2. By submitting, for evaluation, a copy of the school of nursing transcript listing the dates of enrollment in and completion of the school program, the total number of hours of instruction and total number of days or weeks of clinical laboratory experience completed in all areas during the program.} if the applicant qualifies for licensure by endorsement from that state, territory or Canada under 4 CSR 200-4.020(4). Each applicant under this section must cause a photostatic copy of a nursing transcript to be provided to the board office except that registered professional nurse applicants may instead cause the Commission on Graduates of Foreign Nursing Schools to submit directly to the board office a CGFNS certificate indicating successful completion of the CGFNS examination in place of the school of nursing transcript.

(B) Guidelines for evaluating intercountry transcripts for professional/practical nurse applicants are the minimum

standards for accredited schools in Missouri in effect at the time the candidate {graduated} originally became licensed in another state, territory or Canada by examination or at the time of application.

(10) Licensure Renewal.

(B) The required fee shall be submitted {in a timely fashion} prior to the date the license lapses.

(11) Inactive Licenses.

(C) No person shall practice nursing or hold himself/herself out as a nurse in Missouri while his {or} /her license is registered with the State Board of Nursing as being {upon} on inactive status.

(D) If a nurse requesting reinstatement of his/her inactive license is denied by the State Board of Nursing, based upon the fact that that nurse is subject to disciplinary action under any provisions of chapter 335, RSMo, the nurse shall be notified of the statutory right to file a complaint with the Administrative Hearing Commission.

(E) A nurse whose license is inactive for three (3) years or more shall file the petition, documents and fees required in subsection (11)(B). In addition, the nurse may be required to personally appear before the board and demonstrate evidence of current nursing knowledge and may be required to successfully complete an oral and/or written examination provided by the board or by proof of regular licensed nursing practice in other states during that time period.

(12) Lapsed Licenses, When - Procedures for Reinstatement.

(A) Pursuant to sections 335.056 and 335.061, RSMo, a license issued by the State Board of Nursing to a registered professional nurse or licensed practical nurse is "lapsed" if the nurse fails to renew that license in a timely fashion. A license renewal is timely if the nurse {deposits} mails a completed application for renewal, accompanied by the requisite fee, in a properly stamped and addressed envelope, postmarked no later than the expiration date of the nurse's current license. No person shall practice nursing or hold him/herself out as a nurse in Missouri while his/her license is registered with the State Board of Nursing as being lapsed.

(B) A nurse whose license has lapsed in Missouri for less than {sixty (60) days for the licensing periods 1980-81, 1981-82 and} thirty (30) days {for each licensing period thereafter} may obtain renewal of that license by mailing the requisite petition for renewal and fee to the proper address and postmarked no later than the {60th day of lapse for the licensing periods 1980-81, 1981-82 and} 30th day of lapse. {for each licensing period thereafter} Satisfactory explanation of the lapse will be presumed; the State Board of Nursing, in its discretion, may not renew the license of any nurse who is subject to disciplinary action under chapter 335, RSMo but the board shall advise the nurse of the statutory right to file a complaint with the Administrative Hearing Commission.

(C) A nurse whose license has lapsed in Missouri for {sixty (60) days or more for the licensing periods 1980-81, 1981-82 and} thirty (30) days or more {for each licensing period thereafter} but less than three (3) years must petition, upon a form furnished by the board, the State Board of Nursing for renewal of the license. Accompanying the petition shall be all requisite fees, including all unpaid fees for the years in which the license was lapsed. The nurse shall also include with the requisite fees a late renewal fee of twenty-five dollars (\$25) This petition shall show under oath or affirmation of the nurse -

(14) Change of Name and/or Address.

(B)2. If a change of address has occurred since the issuance of the current license renewal, it is necessary for the license renewal to be returned to the Missouri State Board of Nursing for correction. If a corrected license renewal is desired, the current license renewal and required fee must accompany such evidence. Each licensee must notify the board of any change in the licensee's mailing address prior to the expiration date of the licensee's current license.

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EMPLOYMENT GUIDELINES  
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To assist employers in hiring new employees, the following information is provided:

VALIDATION OF LICENSURE

Ask to see an original current Missouri license or a temporary work permit before the new employee reports for orientation.

NOTE: . . .

A DUPLICATE LICENSE will look like the regular wallet license but it will have "DUPLICATE" typed below the date the license expires.

A TEMPORARY WORK PERMIT will have a raised Board Seal.

Please contact the Missouri State Board of Nursing if you suspect any evidence of alteration to a temporary permit or license.

ABOUT ORIENTATION

Orientation is considered to be employment. Any nurse in orientation MUST have either a valid Missouri temporary work permit or a current Missouri license.

The ONLY exception to this policy is the new graduate pending results of the first available licensing examination following graduation.

EMPLOYMENT GUIDELINES, cont.  
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PROPER SUPERVISION

4 CSR 200-5.010 (1) The definition based upon Chapter 335 used by the Missouri State Board of Nursing. Proper Supervision means the general overseeing and the authorizing to direct in any given situation. This includes orientation, initial and ongoing direction, procedural guidance and periodic inspection and evaluation.

NEW GRADUATES WRITING THE EXAM IN MISSOURI - PRIOR TO EXAM

A new graduate writing the FIRST AVAILABLE examination following graduation from an accredited school of nursing is covered under Missouri Statutes, Chapter 335.081 (6) RSMo "Exempted practices and practitioners," to work in Missouri as a graduate nurse until results of the examination are received.

A new graduate who applies to write the examination in Missouri will not be issued a graduate temporary work permit, as the Board has no mechanism to do so. Employers may telephone the Board office for verification of an application for licensure by examination.

NEW GRADUATES WRITING THE EXAM IN MISSOURI - RESULTS RECEIVED

A new graduate writing the examination in Missouri is licensed automatically upon receipt of passing results.

When results are received, the successful writer will be sent either:

1. Results and a license. (The ability to send a license with results depends on the availability of the computer to generate licenses at the time results are received. If a license is not sent with the results, it will follow in approximately two (2) weeks.)

OR . . .

2. Results indicating "Pass" and a letter of verification which is to be presented to the employer. The letter will be signed per stamp by Florence B. McGuire, Executive Director.

NEW GRADUATES WRITING THE EXAM IN ANOTHER STATE, WORKING IN MISSOURI - PRIOR TO EXAM

A new graduate writing the FIRST AVAILABLE examination following graduation in ANOTHER STATE is covered under Missouri Statutes, Chapter 335.081 (6) RSMo, "Exempted practices and practitioners," to work in Missouri as a graduate nurse without any form of permit until results are received from the state in which the graduate wrote the examination. However, a graduate writing the examination in another state may be issued a graduate temporary work permit, if requested, and the proper information is provided. A graduate writing the examination in another state wishing to obtain an out-of-state graduate temporary work permit should send a written request to the Missouri State Board of Nursing. The request must include the graduate's name, address, and state in which the examination will be written.

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EMPLOYMENT GUIDELINES, cont.

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NEW GRADUATES WRITING THE EXAM IN ANOTHER STATE, WORKING IN MISSOURI - RESULTS RECEIVED:

The period of exempted practice for a new graduate writing the examination in another state ENDS on the day that results are received by the graduate writing in that state.

A new graduate writing the examination in another state must contact the Missouri State Board of Nursing immediately upon receipt of results.

In order for a new graduate writing the examination in another state to continue working in Missouri following receipt of results, a Missouri temporary work permit must be presented to the employer.

The Board of Nursing MUST receive the following, in order to issue a temporary work permit to a new graduate writing the examination in another state, working in Missouri:

1. Copy of results indicating a passing score and any accompanying documentation from the examining state indicating that the applicant has the authority to practice in that state.

OR . . .

2. Copy of a license from the original state.

The Missouri State Board of Nursing has established a grace period of thirty (30) days from the time results are received by a graduate writing the examination in another state, to secure a temporary work permit or license in Missouri. If an interstate graduate has not received a temporary work permit within the thirty (30) day grace period, s/he MUST CEASE WORK IMMEDIATELY or it will be a violation of the Missouri Nurse Practice Act.

A new graduate writing the examination in another state should begin the Missouri licensure process as soon as possible to avoid interruption of employment while completing the licensure process.

MESSAGE FROM BOARD MEMBER - MARY MITCHELL  
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At this writing, I am well into my final year of appointment as a Practical Nurse Educator to the Board. In deciding what I would like to communicate as I write for this Newsletter (probably the last time) I find myself pondering over the events that have occurred during these past three years and reflecting on what a busy time it has been. I am very grateful for having had the opportunity to serve as a Board Member and feel the experience has been both personally and professionally rewarding. Serving on the Board in a responsible manner is a tremendous commitment of both time and energy. Those institutions which support Board Members in their appointment to the Board and make the necessary allowances to relieve them of their daily responsibilities in order to function, deserve a great deal of praise as they make the necessary sacrifices to have that person away so often. I personally am very grateful to Sikeston Public Schools and the faculty of the Practical Nurse Program who made many adjustments to cover my assignments over the past years.

There were many aspects of the State Board of Nursing that I became enlightened to after I began serving on the Board. One of the most notable is the magnitude of the responsibilities of the staff of the Missouri State Board of Nursing. It is well beyond the scope of this article to even touch on how the staff functions on a day-to-day basis. The composition of the Board is that of the appointment of one non-voting Public Member, five Registered Nurses and two Licensed Practical Nurses. When anyone agrees to serve on the Board, it must be with the intent and the interest to serve the health care consumer in this State and not special interest groups. I would highly recommend that anyone given the opportunity and having the availability, would agree to serve in a Board Member capacity.

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NOTE OF GRATITUDE  
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The State Board of Nursing wishes to extend their gratitude to Management Information Systems (MIS) of the Department of Economic Development, for the speed and efficiency with which they contributed in helping to get the July, 1987 NCLEX-RN exam results out.

It is important to the Board of Nursing to generate licenses as quickly and accurately as possible. Without the help and support given by the MIS staff this goal could not be accomplished.

 EXAMINATION RESULTS  
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Examination booklets are scored on a first come, first scored basis at the testing center in Monterey, California.

The staff of the State Board of Nursing are always as anxious as the candidates ... and sometimes even more anxious, to receive results from exams.

In an effort to be one of the first states to be scored, the staff have tried various methods of packaging and shipping the test booklets to NCLEX. At the July, 1987 exam the staff decided to stay late to package and ship the booklets directly from the testing site. This idea proved to be most effective. Results were received from NCLEX on August 13, 1987 (29 days following exam ... and only 21 working days) and licenses were printed and mailed by August 14, 1987. To date, this was the shortest waiting period in history for candidates.

The Missouri State Board of Nursing staff again put forth an "extra effort" to make Missouri #1!

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RECENT FINDINGS IN ALZHEIMER'S RESEARCH AND WHAT IT MEANS  
MISSOURI ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE AND RELATED DISORDERS TASK FORCE  
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The diagnosis of Alzheimer's Disease, a progressive brain disorder affecting over two and one-half million Americans, is still based on exclusion. Only by excluding potentially reversible causes of cognitive impairment as well as other progressive dementias can a physician arrive at a diagnosis of Alzheimer's. Consequently, the most important aspect of making a diagnosis is to obtain a thorough clinical history of the onset, progression, and nature of impairment from the patient, the patient's family or others who can provide such information.

Unfortunately, there is no marker, blood test, x-ray or even CAT or PET scan that can definitely identify Alzheimer's Disease. A foolproof diagnosis requires microscopic examination of brain tissue, usually post-mortem. However, combining a careful clinical history, a physical, a mental status evaluation and a handful of available diagnostic tests can allow one to diagnose Alzheimer's Disease quite accurately and, more importantly, identify other potentially tractable causes of memory dysfunction.

Inpatients with early memory and cognitive impairment, for example, it is important to consider depression as a cause. Normal aging-related changes must also be entertained. The side-effects and interaction of multiple medications, whether prescribed or over-the-counter, need to be explored. Other 'common' conditions such as electrolyte imbalance and hypothyroidism may also be responsible.

Routine evaluation of patients suspected of having Alzheimer's should include a CBC with differential, SMA-6 + 12 profiles, thyroid function tests, B12 and Folate levels, RPR, UA, CXRY and EKG. A CAT scan of the brain should be done if dementia is of brief duration or if the neurological exam is suggestive of a focal brain lesion.

When clinically indicated, an EEG or Spinal Tap may be done, but these are not part of the routine work-up of Alzheimer's Disease.

The most important diagnostic procedures are the careful history and examination by the concerned physician and distinguishing early stages of dementia from the cognitive changes known to exist in normal aging. This approach will uncover the cause of many dementias and reduce the cost and patient discomfort.

REQUESTS FOR BOARD INTERPRETATION/DECISIONS/RECOMMENDATIONS  
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Correction to the May, 1987 Newsletter:

✓REQUEST: Liability/interpretation of legalities in dispensing medications in a physicians' office.

RESULT (MEETING 03/31/87): Nurses may package, label and dispense medications in a physician's office under the direction of a pharmacist or licensed physician (does not have to be under the direct supervision as stated in the May, 1987 Newsletter). If a nurse fills in the label, then the physician must make a final check.

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1. ✓ REQUEST: R.N.'s - First assisting in surgery.

RESULT (MEETING 06/23/87): It was the decision of the Board that an R.N. with advanced education and preparation acting as a first assistant is within the legal scope of practice of nursing in Missouri.

2. REQUEST: Whether or not L.P.N.'s can change cassettes to pumps and attach them to existing subclavians, Hickman, or Mediport tubings.

RESULT (MEETING 06/23/87): It was the decision of the Board that L.P.N.'s who are I.V. certified, in the process of administering mixed infusion pump pain control medications, may not program or set any function of the pump.

4. REQUEST: Whether or not L.P.N.'s can be trained by Dialysis Units to be supervised by an R.N. to perform Peritoneal Dialysis in nursing homes.

RESULT (MEETING 06/23/87): It was the decision of the Board that L.P.N.'s, with appropriate training, may carry out the appropriate procedures associated with Peritoneal Dialysis with the exception of inserting the catheter and mixing of solutions to be administered.

5. REQUEST: Clarification of qualification for director of a professional nursing program by Jefferson College, Hillsboro, Missouri.
