

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PHILOSOPHY FROM FLO



Some things are as inevitable as sunrise! Rain falls (although that hasn't seemed too reliable lately), weeds grow, folks are born and then they die. The list is long and to some extent you can plan your life around those inevitabilities. That means that the mere occurrence of one of them should not come as a shock, but rather the shock comes from the timing or placement of that occurrence. Rain falls, inevitably, but why on your parade? Weeds grow, inevitably, but why in your petunias? We are continually shocked and amazed at unexpected and unplanned births, as well as what some call untimely deaths.

Human behavior contains inevitables. Given certain conditions or certain behaviors we can more or less depend on given responses. At least we should not be shocked when specific behavior follows other specific behavior. For example, anger and defensiveness produce negative feelings and actions while on the other hand true concern, caring and love most often produce positive attitudes. Changes in life situations create feelings of loss followed by another inevitable, the process of grieving for what once was. If the feelings of loss due to changes are significant then grieving is inevitable regardless of whether the changes are for better or for worse.

The concept around the recent proposal by the AMA to create a new strata of health care worker contains inevitables. Naderism has fostered the development of a society of questioning consumers who no longer automatically accept medical care over which they have no control. Ralph Nader has encouraged questioning of anything done for you or to you, thus creating a situation wherein the physician has suffered a loss of perceived influence, power and prestige. Nursing education has also evolved to the point that nurses are now taught to be problem solvers, independent thinkers and to strive for collegial relationships with others in the health care setting. They are no longer the mindless hand maidens of the physician that they once were and nursing's point of focus is now more often patient advocacy. This has contributed to increasing polarization of the two groups. An excellent article which addresses this subject is "Coalition Building Between Medicine and Nursing" by Katherine Chavigny in Nursing Economics, July/August 1988, Vol 6, Pg. 179-183.

At the same time DRGs and other third party payers along with declines in the economy have reduced ready income for many physicians. In effect, the pot at the end of the rainbow now has a lid on it. Societal trends, reduced physician control in the care setting, and the determination of some lawmakers to control health care spending along with increased tightening of the purse strings by many individual patients have served to create changes in medical practice, changes of sufficient significance so as to be seen as threatening losses. It follows as inevitable that those perceived losses will elicit defensive responses containing obvious elements of anger.

The AMA plans to establish pilot programs to create a level of semi-skilled health care worker called a Registered Care Technologist. Since they will have less preparation than nurses, and will be trained as task oriented technicians with little or no knowledge base to draw from, they will thus be incapable of independent thinking and problem solving. They will be answerable to and regulated by the physicians themselves. This proposal is a blatant attempt to regain the control, power and influence that has been lost.

That this proposal has been made should come as no shock. Geraldene Felton, the President of the American Association of Colleges of Nursing states "AMA's advocacy of a semi-skilled health worker without any input from nurses yet again depicts the woeful lack of collegiality between nursing and medicine". That fact has been apparent to many. What is shocking however, is the AMA's disregard for the fact that the acuity level of patients in hospitals has greatly increased and even nurses with advanced education and experience are hard put at times to safely administer the level of care required. Certainly someone with less preparation can not be expected to function at such a level with any degree of safety and security for the patient, for themselves, for the physician or the nurse who has been placed in charge.

The creating of a brand of health care technologist, as with the creation of anything new, is bound to be expensive, time consuming and will carry organization problems inherent in such a new and untried situation. Who will bear the expense of solid, organized planning, of educating and finally registering those individuals? The consumer of course, the majority of whom can ill afford to do so and who also presently rail against the rising cost of health care in its current state.

There is much concern at present that increasing liability insurance premiums are driving many physicians and some nurses out of practice. Can further increases be avoided if such disregard for safe, knowledgable patient care is allowed to be perpetrated on the public? Is there then likely to follow a greater reduction in the supply of available nurses as well as physicians if the cost of liability insurance becomes increasingly prohibitive?

Inherent in the grieving process for some is irrational behavior. With an individual, one can recommend counseling and one can maintain a wait and see attitude while giving emotional support and gentle guidance. One can say to the grieving individual "Let some time pass before you take major action on anything". With a national group such as AMA those suggestions are hardly appropriate. It then becomes necessary for nursing to respond to that exhibited irrational behavior.


In responding to the AMA proposal, nursings greatest assets lie in the total number of nurses and their historical behavior of rising as a group with great strength in unity when such a response is necessary. Nursing also has impressive leverage with consumer groups such as AARP plus apparent recent increasingly favorable public opinion toward nursing. It is time to rely on those assets.

Unity in nursing is a must, there is no place or time for jealousy and infighting. Mature cohesiveness in opposition to the AMA's proposal must be demonstrated by first making the public aware of the situation and of nursings stand in that situation. Influential consumers must be identified and informed. Also physicians must be made aware of the situation. Not all belong to the AMA and some are unaware of the proposal. Not all physicians will agree with the AMA's proposed solution. The news media must be informed so consumers of health care can be informed also. Every individual nurse must make an all-out effort to educate everyone to the hazards of this thoughtless and ill-timed proposal.

When we are aware that some things are inevitable we can then cease wasting energy on being shocked and surprised when they occur. That this proposal has been initiated was inevitable, but what we do with our collective energy is up to us as a profession. The resolution of this issue may indicate whether we in truth are a profession or merely an occupation as the AMA believes. That question is what this issue is really all about!

When nurses are truly recognized and treated as professionals with the resulting collegial relationships, increased responsibilities, greater utilization of capabilities and skills and above all the needed expansion of nursing's role as patient advocate then we will know the grieving process has finally come to an end. Then nursing and medicine can truly work together for the good of the patient as "complementary professionals" as George F. Will expressed it in "The Dignity of Nursing" Nursing 88, August issue. The nursing shortage will then come to an end. Then is when we can all move ahead toward better more accessible health care, at a more reasonable cost with greater safety to the consumer.

In the meantime, let's be patient advocates with all our strength and intelligence. Let's be certain that a lesser prepared, unsafe level of care is not foisted on the unsuspecting public who will then be required to support it merely for the purpose of assisting the AMA to work through the process of grieving over their loss of control.

APPOINTED TO BOARD

COMMENTS FROM CAROL



At the June meeting, the Board took action to clarify some misleading terminology in the State of Missouri Minimum Standards for Accredited Programs of Professional Nursing, 4 CSR 200 - 2.010 Accreditation and in the State of Missouri Minimum Standards for Accredited Programs of Practical Nursing, 4 CSR 200 - 3.010.

Inappropriate use of the terms, "Continued Accreditation" and "Annual Registration" when referring to a school's accreditation status has caused some confusion on the part of licensees, school officials, prospective students, the General Assembly and other interested parties. The particular section of the Rules in question specify two separate procedures pertaining to schools of nursing; the Procedure for Continued Accreditation and the Procedure for Annual Registration. Board discussion and subsequent action has provided clarification of these two terms which are frequently, but mistakenly, used interchangeably.

To start with the simplest term, Annual Registration by a school is somewhat comparable to annual registration or license renewal by an individual licensee. Each year a licensee who wishes to maintain active licensure in Missouri submits an annual renewal fee and receives in turn a wallet-sized license which states that this licensee may practice professional or practical nursing in Missouri until that license expires in one year. The annual renewal of a nursing license in Missouri does not require a licensee to submit proof of competency or compliance with any set of standards; a licensee is merely required to submit a fee and a renewal form by a specified cutoff date. Annual Registration by a school is merely submitting a fee, in order to be able to conduct business as a nursing program for one more year.

Continued Accreditation, on the other hand, is a different procedure. Continued Accreditation refers to the annual review by the members of the Board of a self-study submitted to the Board by each program in nursing for compliance with the minimum requirements for accreditation prescribed by the Missouri State Board of Nursing. When the Board votes in favor of Continued Accreditation for a school of nursing, implicit in that vote is the idea that a school has been reviewed against a set of specific criteria, the Minimum Standards, and has continued to meet Board standards.

The confusion or blurring of these two terms seems to have been a gradual process, in part probably contributed to by the use of the same document, the Annual Report, to determine a school's eligibility for both Annual Registration and for Continued Accreditation. They are separate ideas which gradually blended into one and became a part of one process.

To strengthen the distinction between these two procedures, the Board has decided to separate them. Each school will continue to receive the Annual Report, that self-study which is used each year in the deliberation for granting Continued Accreditation. This Annual Report is to be completed using information from the previous fiscal year and is to be sent to the Missouri State Board of Nursing prior to October 15, as is stated in the Rules.

Annual Reports which WILL NOT BE ACCOMPANIED BY A FEE, are reviewed in the Board Office for completeness. Missing documentation or additional clarification may be requested by the Education Coordinator. The Reports are then forwarded to the appropriate Board member for in-depth review. The Board member conducting the review may find it necessary to ask the Board staff to contact a school for additional information. At the January Board meeting each year, the Board will consider each school for Continued Accreditation.

The application for Annual Registration will be a separate form, much like an individual nursing license renewal notice. This form will be mailed to each program of nursing in mid-April. This form must be completed and returned to the Board Office with the Annual Registration fee of \$25.00 no later than June 1 of each year. The Annual Registration certificate will be dated from July 1 through June 30 annually. Annual Registration fee for 1988-1989 has not been previously requested and is now due. Please remit before September 15, 1988. This is the only year the registration fee will be due and payable on that specific date. We realize this may cause some of you to remit two fees in the same fiscal year, but this is the only year in which that will occur.

In looking at the past fee schedules, we have noted that prior to 1981, registration fees were submitted on a schedule which corresponded with the fiscal year, rather than the calendar year. We are not now collecting an extra fee, even though you will pay two fees in the same fiscal year. We are merely getting back in synch with the fee schedule and the fiscal year.

- . What if the Board finds a program NOT IN COMPLIANCE with Minimum Standards?
- A. The Board MAY NOT remove Continued Accreditation status from a program of nursing without the same due process which is afforded to all licensees. The Minimum Standards outline the process of Conditional Accreditation as follows:
If the Board determines at any time a program does not meet the requirements for accreditation, the program shall be consulted, a letter detailing the reasons will be sent to the program. The program will be placed on conditional accreditation status upon the mailing of the letter.

The Minimum Standards go on to state that:

Programs wishing to have a hearing regarding accreditation status before the Missouri State Board of Nursing shall notify the board at least three weeks in advance of a regularly scheduled board meeting. All hearings before the board shall be conducted in accordance with sections 536.070 to 536.080, RSMo.

Finally, Minimum Standards address Revocation of Accreditation by stating: Accreditation may be revoked only after notice and hearing in accordance with Chapter 161, RSMo.

Therefore, the safeguards built into the law prevent a school's accreditation status from being removed solely on the basis of review of an Annual Report and a subsequent vote by the Board.

MISSOURI STATE BOARD OF NURSING
POSITION STATEMENT ON AMA REGISTERED CARE TECHNOLOGIST PROPOSAL

The Missouri State Board of Nursing commends the American Medical Association for their concern and interest in alleviating the nursing shortage. This concern reflects the A.M.A.'s desire to facilitate quality health care in the United States.

As a regulatory agency charged with protection of the public by assuring safe and effective nursing care, the Missouri State Board of Nursing opposes the A.M.A.'s Registered Care Technician (RCT) proposal. The Board of Nursing discharges its responsibility through enforcement of the provisions of the Missouri Nurse Practice Act. This statute, promulgated in the interest of quality health care, prohibits the practice of nursing by individuals who do not meet the educational and licensure requirements prescribed in the act. The functions identified for the RCT are those same functions identified in the act as the practice of nursing.

The Board of Nursing believes that individuals providing nursing services with less than the minimal educational preparation and experience pose a significant threat to the health, safety and welfare of patients in all types of health care facilities. This significant difference between the education of RCT's and nurses belies A.M.A.'s proposition that the RCT is interchangeable with a nurse, and will alleviate the nursing shortage.

Of importance to solving the nursing shortage is the need to identify the cause of this problem. The AMA proposal suggests that the shortage is due to the professional development of nursing. However, as has been repeatedly demonstrated, the shortage has resulted from:

1. A higher patient acuity level requiring a greater number of highly skilled nurses at the bedside.
2. An increased national emphasis on wellness utilizing the health oriented skills of nurses, and
3. The availability of more lucrative, professional and autonomous careers for women.

The Board of Nursing believes the nursing shortage is best addressed by focusing on these aspects, of which assisting nursing to become more competitive with other career alternatives is a priority. The Board believes that the need for highly skilled nurses at the bedside cannot be met utilizing personnel who are ill prepared for the present day challenges in health care. Moreover, the implementation of RCT educational programs may further deplete an already dwindling pool of applicants for schools of nursing and thereby accelerate the nursing shortage.

Within the health care setting, the addition of another group of bedside care providers could only serve to further remove nurses from the patient's bedside where they are most needed. Although the RCT proposal suggests that RCT's would answer directly to physicians, the fact is that, because the physician will not be immediately available to these individuals, the nurse must assume responsibility for them. This splintering of responsibility and authority can only serve to further disrupt the continuity and quality of care.

Therefore, we urge the A.M.A. to reconsider the proposal, and to work with National Nursing Organizations to address the manpower requirements for providing patient care, before looking to the creation of a new level of provider to replace practitioners who have proven their competency for safe practice.

NATIONAL COUNCIL OF STATE BOARDS OF NURSING INC.
POSITION ON AMA REGISTERED CARE TECHNOLOGIST (RCT) PROPOSAL

WHEREAS the American Medical Association (AMA) is proposing the creation of a new category of licensed health care worker, to be called a basic or advanced "registered care technologist"; and

WHEREAS the stated objective for the creation of the RCT role is to increase the availability of bedside care givers; and

WHEREAS the role description for the RCT is "execution of medical protocols at the bedside with special emphasis on the technical skills"; and

WHEREAS the AMA proposal calls for RCTs to substitute for nurses at the bedside even though it acknowledges that the scope of nursing practice is much broader than that envisioned for RCTs; and

WHEREAS the lack of clarity in roles would create public confusion about what care givers are responsible for; and

WHEREAS the recruitment of persons for the proposed RCT role would be pulled from the same recruitment pool for nurses; and

WHEREAS the use of the same person pool to recruit bedside care givers would diminish available numbers for nursing.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the National Council of State Boards of nursing strongly oppose the AMA Registered Care Technologist Proposal; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the National Council support all efforts in concert with its Members Boards and the nursing community to prevent its implementation, in interest of public protection; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the National Council send the message of strong opposition to the RCT Proposal to the American Medical Association's Board of Directors; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that National Council's Delegate Assembly support working cooperatively with AMA's Advisory Nursing Consultant Panel to resolve the critical issues of the nursing shortage; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be widely disseminated by Member Boards.

All in all, however, the improvement in behavior was quite noticeable and very pleasing to all who were administering the exam.

Our thanks to all who contributed to that noticeable change in behavior. We can only say "Keep Up The Good Work".

TREATMENT OF BEHAVIORAL SYMPTOMS IN ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE

A particularly problematic behavioral accompaniment of Alzheimer's Disease (AD) may be wandering behavior. The patient with AD either has a need to be pacing or moving around in an aimless fashion or some may show more aggressive wandering. The later behavior is hard to tolerate, particularly in an institution, which may not be properly designed to safely tolerate problem wanderers. These patients are also constant risks for elopement.

The reasons why some patients with AD and related disorders show problem wandering behaviors is not fully understood. Some may pace or move around secondary to boredom. Perhaps it's more common in patients who were formerly quite active walkers and who are now feeling constrained in the institutional environment. Maybe some of these patients have a need to be on the move secondary to an inner, panicky anxiety which they can not effectively communicate verbally due to their cognitive impairment.

The question often arises - what is the best treatment for wandering behavior? Obviously, the "best" treatment is to be able to tolerate it. To have the individual in an environment which is conducive to walking, pacing and moving about in a safe, socially acceptable fashion. Unfortunately, there are not medications which "cure" wandering. They, basically, chemically restrain the individual, often via debilitating side effects.

For some wanderers, an increase in structured activities may help. For others, the staff keeping a behavioral diary may help to identify stressors leading to anxiety which may be manifested by incessant pacing or wandering. Some of these patients may also benefit from small divided doses of an anti-anxiety medication.

The most difficult patients are those who manifest aggressive wandering and assaultive behaviors. Often, these patients are not manageable without medication. Though small divided doses of high potency anti-psychotics may be helpful to some patients - one must always weigh therapeutic effects against potent, at time debilitating side-effects. More recent research has shown that some patients can be well managed by drugs such as trazodone, lithium, carbamazepine, and certain beta blockers, either alone or in combinations.

Fortunately, the vast majority of patients with AD do not show violent/aggressive behaviors. Those who are prone to aggressive/assaultive behavior can be managed by a variety of behavioral/environmental and chemical interventions which are obviously preferable to physical restraints which are poorly tolerated, dehumanizing and often counterproductive.

In our next issue we will discuss the use of physical and chemical restraints in patients with AD and related disorders. A psychiatrist experienced in working the geriatric patients can be a valuable consultant to patients, family and nursing staff dealing with behavioral manifestations of Alzheimer's Disease.

JUNE 1988 LPN/IV THERAPY RULE CLARIFICATIONS

REQUEST: Should there be special considerations/limitations to the present ruling in regard to IV Therapy by LPN's involving neonates?

DECISION: The Missouri LPN/IV Therapy Rules does not limit IV Therapy with neonates but does not include as a requirement that competency be demonstrated on neonates for IV Approval. The IV Approved LPN with additional education and experience may participate in IV therapy with neonates within the guidelines of CSR 200-6.010 Intravenous Fluid Treatment Administration. (LPN/IV Therapy Rule).

BOARD OF NURSING
CONDUCTING LPN/IV SURVEY

As part of the continuing evaluation process of the LPN/IV Therapy Rule, the Board of Nursing is conducting a survey of all IV Approved LPN's currently licensed in Missouri. This survey was first conducted in 1984, at which time there were approximately 300 IV Approved LPN's actively licensed in Missouri.

All IV Approved LPN's will receive the survey at the beginning of September. The Board will review the survey results at a regularly scheduled meeting following tabulation of responses. A Summary of results will appear in a future Newsletter.

REQUESTS FOR BOARD INTERPRETATIONS/DECISIONS/RECOMMENDATIONS

1. ✓ REQUEST: Is it within the practice of an RN to perform a urine pregnancy test without a physician's order/protocol?"

DECISION (MEETING 06/20/88): It was the decision of the Board that it is within the scope of nursing practice for RNs and LPNs to perform urine pregnancy tests. This act is considered part of nursing assessment and does not require a physicians order.

2. ✓ REQUEST: Is it within the practice of an RN to administer and monitor continuous epidural drips on non-intensive care units?

DECISION (MEETING 06/20/88): It was the decision of the Board that regardless of the setting, the administration of epidural drop/bolus, administering of Versed/Sufenta, removal of epidural catheter, is within the scope of RN practice. It is appropriate for RNs to perform these functions, when the RN has the experience, skill and training to do the same. The Board further stated that the level of monitoring and physician availability related to the above referenced function should be tailored to the level of skill, experience and training of the nurse and must fit within the setting's guidelines, policies and procedures.

3. ✓ REQUEST: Is placing peripherally inserted central line catheters within the scope of RN practice?

DECISION (MEETING 06/20/88): It was the decision of the Board that RNs with appropriate experience and training, may insert central IV lines.

4. ✓ REQUEST: Is changing an existing gastrostomy tube and existing suprapubic catheter within the scope of RN practice?

DECISION (MEETING 06/20/88): It was the decision of the Board, that changing of existing gastrostomy tubes and existing suprapubic catheters by the RN is within the scope of practice.

On several occasions licensee was under influence of alcohol while on duty.
