The meeting was a "working meeting" with the members breaking out into groups to look closely at certain portions of the Minimum Standards. The next meeting will be held on October 9, 1989 at the Harry S Truman State Office Building.

The Advanced Practice Task Force will hold a meeting on September 18, 1989 at the Harry S. Truman State Office Building. The task force continues to study the feasibility of regulating advanced practice.

PHILOSOPHY FROM FLO

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

A most exciting thing has happened!! Missouri applied for and has been selected as a field test state for the National Council of State Boards of Nursing's Computerized Adaptive Testing Project. We are most pleased to have been selected to participate in this important and innovative project.

The "CAT" project began with a feasibility study which was considered to be positive. The Delegate Assembly then voted for the continuation of that project and item writing began. The same format was utilized for selecting item writers for "CAT" as is utilized for the NCLEX-RN and PN and every state had the opportunity to submit recommendations to the National Council of State Boards of Nursing for item writers. From items prepared, software was then developed that utilized items considered appropriate for determining nursing licensure.

Next a pilot project was run utilizing nursing licensure examinees in a mock test situation and each prospective nurse in the project was able to successfully use the software to take the "CAT" test. Their reactions were highly favorable so the Delegate Assembly of NCSBN voted in 1988 to proceed to Phase II of the project.

Since that time the committee has worked on several key tasks which must be accomplished including security measures, legal analysis, operational issues and psychometric issues. They are now ready to move on to the important items of developing procedure manuals, field test materials, checklists and the most exciting portion for us, field testing the edited item pool.

The "CAT" project appears to be progressing as expected when I review the time line prepared by that committee. Selection and notification of field test sites was timed for July, 1989, with identification of schools with candidates that fit sample requirements in December 1989, selection of candidates in February 1990, and subsequent field testing in July 1990 and February 1991. Missouri has been scheduled to field test the February 1991 NCLEX-RN. There is a lot of work to be done between now and then. We have many questions to be answered but the idea is so stimulating that I'm certain we will have little difficulty motivating schools and candidates to participate.

Eight states and four alternates were selected by National Council of State Boards of Nursing as field test sites from the almost thirty who volunteered. There is a great deal of excitement expressed by all in anticipation of this project. There is also loads of envy expressed by those states who volunteered and were not fortunate enough to be selected. The selected states are as follows:

Primary among the issues to be researched in this phase of the project are operational issues such as logistics, costs, staffing and computer needs. Other issues include security procedures, legal and psychometric issues.

"CAT" is a milestone in licensure history. I have dreamed wished and hoped for the day that we could cease the antiquated paper and pencil "show" that we produce four (4) times every year. It's a highly efficient inefficiency. It's very difficult to believe that the ability to practice safely can be determined accurately by a paper and pencil test. Computer exams are much newer and reportedly more effective and accurate at determining entry level knowledge than can be done with paper and pencil. The Board staff have become efficiency experts at delivering the NCLEX to large numbers of people at once and at the same time complying with security measures, and all other rules and regulations established for the purpose of assuring stability and standardization leading to the ability for endorsement. There is however a great deal of inefficiency which is innately a part of the process. I am hoping we can see many of the inefficiencies deleted, dissatisfaction, stresses and long waiting periods minimized for the benefit of both nurses and employers.

We will receive more specific direction and additional information as we progress through the processes involved in this most new and innovative project and will pass it on to you as we receive and understand it. Hope you are as excited as we are. If you have questions please call. Carol and I will be glad to discuss this, our latest project.

As usual, the annual Delegate Assembly of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing brought about some changes which will have an impact in Missouri. Some of the major actions of the 1989 Delegate Assembly held in August in regards to licensure examinations are as follows:

VOTED TO EXTEND THE CTB-MCGRAW HILL CONTRACT TO PROVIDE THE NCLEX LICENSURE EXAMINATIONS FOR TWO MORE YEARS,

VOTED TO CONDUCT REGULARLY SCHEDULED RN AND PN JOB ANALYSES NO LESS FREQUENTLY THAN EVERY THREE YEARS AND ROTATED SO THAT ANALYSES DO NOT OCCUR SIMULTANEOUSLY, AND

VOTED TO ADOPT THE PROPOSED REVISION OF THE NCLEX-PN TEST PLAN.

The Missouri State Board of Nursing mailed copies of the draft of the NCLEX-PN test plan in December 1988 to Coordinators of Schools of Practical Nursing for review and comment. Included with this memo was a question and answer document prepared by the National Council to clarify aspects of the proposed test plan. The National Council has allowed us to reprint the newly adopted NCLEX-PN Test Plan in this newsletter; however, to receive a typeset copy for your use, you may contact the NCSBN office regarding price and date of availability.

The next step in implementation of the new test plan is finalizing the Knowledge, Skills and Abilities statements for the detailed test plan. Missouri is proud to be the home of Patricia Winberg, BSN, Resource Instructor at the Kansas City Board of Education Practical Nursing Program. Pat has been hired as a consultant by NCSBN to write the KSA statements for the detailed test plan. The Examination Committee expects the KSA statements to be finalized by April, 1990.

The next step would then be standard setting for the new test plan. Remember that each time the test plan is revised, a new passing standard must be set, as was the case for the new NCLEX-RN Test Plan in 1988. First administration of the new NCLEX-PN examination is targeted for October, 1990.

Anyone who is interested in receiving a copy of the NCSBN question and answer document concerning the test plan is encouraged to write the the Missouri State Board of Nursing to request a copy.

COMMENTS FROM CAROL (CONTINUED)

It is important to keep in mind that the job analysis studies will potentially impact nursing school curricula each time they are done. One component of a legally defensible licensure examination is that the examination tests current entry level practice. If a job analysis study indicates a change in entry level practice from the last study, the potential result is a change in the existing test plan. A change in the test plan necessitates evaluation of the passing standard. And, critical to programs of nursing, a change in the test plan also necessitates an evaluation of the current curriculum to be sure that it is congruent with actual entry level practice.

Additional information provided at convention by the Examination Committee concerned a more clear answer to that always-asked question, "How many questions do I have to answer correctly in order to receive a passing designation?" The Examination Committee offers the following APPROXIMATIONS:

NCLEX-RN - There are approximately 360 questions on the RN exam (four, ninety-minute booklets; one minute per question). Of those 360 questions, approximately 300 are REAL items (not tryout questions; a real item is used to determine a passing designation). Of the 300 real items, approximately 2/3, or 200 questions would need to be answered correctly in order to achieve a passing designation.

NCLEX-PN - There are approximately 240 questions on the LPN exam (two, two hour booklets; one minute per question). Of those 240 questions, approximately 204 are REAL items. Of the 204 real items, approximately 2/3, or 136 questions would need to be answered correctly in order to achieve a passing designation.

Finally, the diagnostic profile for unsuccessful candidates has been enhanced to assist failure candidates in preparing for subsequent examinations. If a candidate's examination has already been handscored as a part of the quality assurance service which calls for automatic handscoring of examinations which fall near the point of minimum competence, the diagnostic profile will indicate that handscoring was done. The Examination Committee is finalizing other proposed improvements in the diagnostic profile. We will report any other changes in this newsletter as they occur.

I would also like to remind faculty in schools of professional nursing that the detailed NCLEX-RN Test Plan is available for purchase by schools or students from the National Council for a cost of \$3.00.

NLN'S BIENNIAL CONVENTION - SEATTLE, WASHINGTON

To borrow a phrase from one of Sister Rosemary Donnelly's addresses and one which was paraphrased by a friend of mine, the past 19th Biennial Convention of the National League for Nursing was a "Kinder and Gentler" convention from some of those in the past. This convention passed resolutions titled:

1. Opposition to AMA's RCT Proposal
2. The Community College of Nursing Alternative to the RCT Proposal
3. Service-Education Collaboration for Career mobility
4. Educational Articulation
5. Gerontologic component of Nursing Education
6. The Challenge of Learning Styles
7. Human caring as a Public Agenda
8. Handling of Infectious Waste
9. Support of Greater Consumer Access to Nursing
10. Support for Innovative Curricula for Nursing Education
11. Elimination of Tuberculosis by the year 2010
12. Resolution Honoring Congressman Claude Pepper

Many of these resolutions are corollary to NLN's manifesto which promotes that nursing education must be accessible to as well as accomplishable for prospective students.

The convention's educational sessions were well attended and included programs on accreditation, curriculum designs and evaluations, technology in nursing education, students learning styles and expectations and creating learning pathways (only to name a few).

As I read the "promos" describing the Keynote speaker, I wondered how she would be pertinent when there seemed to be no apparent relationship between Linda Ellerbee and nursing. Her first remarks acknowledged her lack of insight into nursing or nursing problems. However, relativism to women's issues became apparent very early in her remarks. She recalled the many inequities which occurred from being a woman competing in a man's world. Many of us have experienced similar situations on some occasion or another, however, the similarity probably ends there. Her candor was humorous, shocking and often unacceptable in most areas of nursing and nursing education. None-the-less, as a Keynoter, she certainly exhibited a sometimes overlooked need to be able to laugh at ourselves.

I found it interesting that NLN is developing new guidelines and criteria for accreditation of schools. NLN's policies and procedures have recently been reviewed by the United States Department of Education. This process began with a self-study which was submitted in January, 1989 and concluded with a site visit last March, 1989. The site visit report contained high commendations for thoroughness and expert qualifications of board members and staff, the Helene Fuld Foundation's "Educational Outcomes Study", and NLN Division of Research's

"Newly Licensed Nurse Survey". The report also included concerns regarding absence of objective, verifiable outcome measures, absence of consistency/uniformity across councils and public accountability and disclosure relative to warnings and time periods between reviews. These concerns resulted in several recommendations being made by the Committee on Accreditation to the NLN Executive Committee. The central theme of these recommendations is that a outcome-oriented criteria for accreditation be developed. The final outcome of the review is that NLN continues to be fully recognized by the United States Department of Education as the national accrediting agency for associate, baccalaureate and higher degree, diploma and practical nursing programs.

Brigadier General Clara L. Adams-Ender, MMAS, MSN, RN, Chief, Army Nurse Corps presented the Dorothy Novello Memorial Lecture. The title of her topic was "Health Policy-What will the Next Decade Demand?" Her address cited three major trends as having significant impact on nursing:

1. Technology: Computers will be commonplace. They will be smaller and more widely used.
2. Education: There will be expansion in education and training programs. The cost of nursing education will increase. The number of Associate Degree Nursing Programs will increase. There will also be a shortage of qualified nurse educators. Assessing educational outcomes will be paramount. Outcomes must include the understanding of cultures.
3. Increased Specialization: There will be increased specialization. Excellence across all areas will not be possible because of the needs of the patient.
4. The status of nursing will be elevated: The use of assistants will also increase. The educational entry level will be resolved by specialization.

Adams-Ender discussed Waterman's "Four Specific Actions to Resolve Health Care Challenges" as:

1. Promote Team Work - The lack of team-work leads to poor outcomes. Team work is essential at all levels.
2. Develop Trust Relationships - Must resolve "We-They" positions. This would empower the workforce.
3. Be involved in politics - Politics are always present.
4. Learn to pursue and wield power - Necessary for patient care and the nurse's advocacy role, but this power must be shared.

I felt these were interesting comments. I'm not sure who has the only accurate crystal ball to forecast nursing's future, but it is good to listen to those who contemplate the future and are certain enough to make predictions. There is hope and challenge in Adams-Ender's comments for all of nursing education.

Once again, this was an important nursing conference! I believe NLN's vision is syntactical with nursing issues of concern. I will close this article with their Biennium goals;

1. Strengthen nursing's role in the promotion of quality health care that is both accessible and affordable.
2. Promote quality in nursing practice.
3. Assure quality in nursing education.
4. Enhance a consumer partnership in activities to attain the goals of the organization.
5. Develop creative approaches to the resolution of health care problems through collaboration.
6. Implement organization restructuring of NLN to support flexibility for future growth and development.
7. Ensure the financial solvency of the organization through sound management of resources and creation of additional revenue-generating activities.

Revised Accreditation Schedule

For years there have been only two professional staff persons employed by the Missouri State Board of Nursing. Disregarding the fact that the number of licensed nurses and nursing schools have greatly increased, these two professional staff persons were attempting to accomplish all the functions relegated to the nursing board. As a result, some functions had to be postponed until time permitted. This resulted in some schools not being resurveyed five years from their previous survey. Now that professional staff has been increased, there is a need to redistribute the dates of school surveys. Redistribution will allow a manageable number of surveys to be scheduled annually. Such action is imperative to allow Board members to conduct surveys and still attend to their program's needs. The bottom line is, your school may be resurveyed exactly five years from your previous survey or it may be placed in a four-year or six year time frame. Some schools will be affected by this staggered schedule, but it is a one time occurrence and then we can all return to a regular five year cycle.

NURSING PRACTICE DECISIONS

JUNE 20-23, 1989

REQUEST: Whether an allergy technologist must be a licensed nurse in the State of Missouri?

DECISION: The administration of allergy tests and allergy medications, orally and by injection requires a licensed nurse or physician.

REQUEST: Board decision in regard to the following situation: An insulin-dependent diabetic who is not epileptic and whose blood sugar when last checked a few hours ago was 130mg. has a seizure at home, what immediate action should the nurse take? Can she legally administer glucagon or should she transport the patient to a hospital for treatment?

DECISION: A nurse can administer glucagon in the home with a physicians order or standing protocol.

REQUEST: What is the Board's opinion regarding re-dosing epidural catheters using Morphine, Fentanyl or other narcotics, by registered nurses who have been inserviced and approved by anesthesia personnel? What is the liability of the registered nurse?

DECISION: With additional education and experience in the administration of anesthetics, registered nurses may administer drugs for the purpose of anesthesia per epidural injections/infusions. The administration of drugs for the purpose of analgesia per epidural injection/infusion is within the scope of registered nurse practice with advanced education and experience. Please consult an attorney regarding civil liability vs. licensure liability. This is not within the scope of practice for the IV Certified LPN.

REQUEST: Board opinion regarding nurses being requested to perform procedures which they are not trained and/or educated to perform.

DECISION: The hallmark of a professional is knowing the limits of one's knowledge. In order to function as a professional a nurse must have specialized education, judgement and skill. A nurse who functions without adequate education, judgement and skill is subject to disciplinary action. The responsibility for determining whether that education, judgement and skill is adequate rests with the individual nurse and the profession of nursing.

NURSING PRACTICE DECISIONS (CONTINUED)

REQUEST: Board consideration of "Proposal for Nurse Midwifery Practice Acknowledgment".

DECISION: Request was denied on the basis that the Board of Nursing at this time has no legal authority to recognize specific advanced practitioners. The Board has gone on record as recognizing advanced practitioners as a group.

REQUEST: In this state can unlicensed persons perform the following functions:

1. Maintain patient contact and patient assessment skills.
2. Maintain psychomotor skills:
 - a. Maintain and develop proper skills in intravenous line (peripheral) placement.
 - b. Maintain and enhance proper skills in feeding tube and NG tube placements.
 - c. Maintain and enhance proper skills in the placement of foley catheters.
 - d. Maintain and develop proper skills in the drawing of blood and arterial blood gases.
 - e. Maintain and develop proper skills in the assessment of patient vital signs.
3. Assist in the development of criteria and teaching techniques in the above targeted areas.

DECISION: A through D of objective number two are considered a part of nursing practice and therefore require a license to perform. Objective number two (2) E may be done by an unlicensed person at the level of obtaining vital signs and identifying deviations from normal. Individuals who are not licensed persons may only function in the capacity of unlicensed persons when they are functioning outside of their educational program

REQUEST: Board clarification of the role of a graduate nurse who is unsuccessful on the licensure examination.

DECISION: A graduate nurse who is unsuccessful on the licensure examination can not function as a licensed nurse and may function in the role of a nurse attendant or as an unlicensed person and may not maintain the title of graduate nurse.

This issue of the Newsletter is the first in a series of articles regarding chemically impaired nurses. The articles will include identification, intervention, confrontation and reentry issues surrounding chemically impaired nurses.

IDENTIFICATION OF THE CHEMICALLY IMPAIRED NURSE

If a nurse's job performance was noted to deteriorate accompanied by personality and behavior changes, would his/her peers suspect substance abuse? If not, they should think again. One would think that nurses with their extensive pharmacology background would be immune to chemical dependency. However, chemical dependency is alive and well in the nursing profession. Current statistics suggest that one out of seven nurses is or will become chemically dependent. In the State of Missouri there is a total of 75,110 nurses. Using this statistic that would calculate to 10,730 chemically dependent or chemically "impaired" Missouri nurses.

The majority of nurses utilize their employer as their source of drugs. There are three (3) basic methods of drug diversion. Drug substitution requires the nurse to substitute a look-alike substance for the chemical desired (withdrawing Demerol and replacing it with sterile water). False record keeping by the nurse is another method. It is not uncommon for these nurses to report more incidents of breakage, spillage, and wastage of controlled substances. The third form of drug diversion is theft.

The most frequently diverted drug is demerol. Other frequently abused and misappropriated drugs include Valium, Dilaudid, Morphine Sulfate, Fentanyl, Tylenol #3 and the codeine-containing drugs, Darvon, Seconal, Fiorinol, and Xanax. Nurses have also been found to abuse "street" drugs, but due to the accessibility of the narcotics found at their place of employment are used much less frequently.

Identifying a nurse under the influence of controlled substances or alcohol in the work place may not be as easy as it may appear. The nurse may back away from his/her peers so that smelling of their breath can not be done. The nurse may exhibit slurred speech, unsteady gait, tremors, dilated or constricted pupils, diaphoresis, or rhinorrhea. More general signs and symptoms can include the following: irritable with peers and patients; mood swings; isolates him/herself; numerous injuries; evidence of blackouts; strong interest in patient pain control medications; frequent trips to the restroom; illogical or sloppy charting. Discrepancies may be noted between what is charted on the patient medication administration record and the unit controlled substance sign-out documents as well as in the medication record and the patient's report.

IDENTIFICATION OF THE CHEMICALLY IMPAIRED NURSE (CON'T)

The chemically impaired nurse will not look like a skid-row bum or appear to be the worst nurse on a unit. Research findings indicate the impaired nurse is generally thought of as a "supernurse". They typically are bright, well educated, and graduated in the upper one-third of their nursing class. This nurse usually is respected by colleagues for outstanding job performance that continues even after the addiction develops.

Rehabilitation is the goal for the impaired nurse. Because these nurses generally have so much to offer the profession, it is a shame to see this talent wasted. More and more employers and Boards of Nursing are realizing what a tremendous resource these nurses are, and actively working with them to allow their continued nursing practice.

For years, health care employers have fired nurses whom they suspected of having a chemical dependency problem. This "throwaway" approach to the problem did little to encourage nurses to seek the chemical dependency treatment they so desperately needed. Today, more employers and Boards of Nursing are encouraging these nurses to seek help and assisting them in returning to work and maintaining abstinence. As a result of these measures, approximately eighty-five percent (85%) of impaired nurses can learn to control their disease and remain productive patient care providers.

EMPLOYERS NOTE:

At their June, 1989 meeting, the members of the Missouri State Board of Nursing voted to allow the release of licensure information, not currently allowed under the Mandatory Reporting Rule, provided the request is accompanied by an "Authorization of Release of Information" signed by the nurse in question. The Mandatory Reporting Rule (refer to Spring, 1988 Newsletter) only allows the release of complaint information when both the complainant and verifying employer are hospitals and/or ambulatory surgical centers. With a signed authorization form, the Board may release complaint information when either the complainant or inquiring employer is not a mandated reporter.
