PHILOSOPHY FROM FLO

Nurse Practice Acts are very similar from one state to another. That must be so in order to have the advantage of mobility through endorsement across the country. The framework and intent of the laws are basically the same. They are all for the primary purpose of protecting the public; they regulate licensure, regulate nursing education, and also, discipline the licenses of those who violate the law. Because of this there are many similarities in wording.

At the same time, there are many differences. These differences reflect the individuality of the people authoring the statutes as well as each individual states rights. The differences are also reflective of the fact that we have endorsement but do not have reciprocity. Reciprocity indicates that one will be granted a license based solely upon licensure in another state. Endorsement, on the other hand, indicates that one must meet the requirements of the state in which she/he wishes to be licensed but that state will accept licensure in another state as an indication that the nurse successfully wrote the NCLEX. There is a significant difference between the two.

One specific difference may be seen in the wording of definitions within the law. Some laws, in defining nursing, describe behavior while others describe the person. Missouri's statute describes nursing behavior for practical nursing and professional nursing.

The definitions of both practical and professional nursing, as written in Missouri Statutes Chapter 335.016, are as follows:

- (7) "Practical nursing" is the performance for compensation of selected acts for the promotion of health and in the care of persons who are ill, injured, or experiencing alterations in normal health processes. Such performance requires substantial specialized skill, judgment and knowledge. All such nursing care shall be given under the direction of a person licensed in this state to prescribe medications and treatments or under the direction of a registered professional nurse;
- (8) "Professional nursing" is the performance for compensation of any act which requires substantial specialized education, judgment, and skill based on knowledge and application of principles derived from the biological, physical, social and nursing sciences, including, but not limited to:
 - (a) Responsibility for the teaching of health care and the prevention of illness to the patient and his family; or
 - (b) Assessment, nursing diagnosis, nursing care, and counsel of persons who are ill, injured or experiencing alterations in normal health processes; or
 - (c) The administration of medications and treatments as prescribed by a person licensed in this state to prescribe such medications and treatments; or
 - (d) The coordination and assistance in the delivery of a plan of health care with all members of the health team; or
 - (e) The teaching and supervision of other persons in the performance of any of the foregoing;

PHILOSOPHY FROM FLO, cont.

There are several key words and phrases in the body of those definitions. The phrase "for compensation" indicates reimbursement for services; licensure is not required for those providing volunteer services where no payment is received. However, nurses may not sign "L.P.N." or "R.N." after their names or in any other way hold themselves out to be a nurse unless duly licensed. The portion of the law dealing with exempted practice is 335.081 (1-9) and specifically lists those activities which do not require a license. They are as follows:

- (1) The practice of any profession for which a license is required and issued under the laws of this state by a person duly licensed to practice that profession;
- (2) The services rendered by technicians, nurses aides or their equivalent trained and employed in public or private hospitals and licensed long-term care facilities except the services rendered in licensed long-term care facilities shall be limited to administering medication, excluding injectables other than insulin;
- (3) The providing of nursing care by friends or members of the family of the person receiving such care;
- (4) The incidental care of the sick, aged, or infirm by domestic servants or persons primarily employed as housekeepers;
- (5) The furnishing of nursing assistance in the case of an emergency situation;
- (6) The practice of nursing under proper supervision as a part of the course of study by students enrolled in accredited schools of professional nursing or in schools of practical nursing or by graduates of such schools or courses pending the results of the first licensing examination scheduled by the board following such graduation;
- (7) The practice of nursing in this state by any legally qualified nurse duly licensed to practice in another state whose engagement requires him to accompany and care for a patient temporarily residing in this state for a period not to exceed six months;
- (8) The practice of any legally qualified nurse who is employed by the government of the United States or any bureau, division or agency thereof, while in the discharge of his official duties or to the practice of any legally qualified nurse serving in the armed forces of the United States while stationed within this state;
- (9) Nonmedical nursing care of the sick with or without compensation when done in connection with the practice of the religious tenets of any church by adherents thereof, as long as they do not engage in the practice of nursing as defined in sections 335.011 to 335.096.

Other portions of the definitions for nursing indicate in a general way the level of nursing to be performed. The definition for practical nursing contains the phrase "selected acts for the promotion of health and in the care of persons who are ill, injured, or experiencing alterations in normal health processes." This, plus the statement that all nursing care "will be given under the direction of a person

licensed in this state to prescribe medications and treatments or under the direction of a registered professional nurse," indicates a more limited practice than that of the professional nurse who, according to law, performs "any act" including, among other things, the administration of medications and treatments as prescribed by a person licensed in this state to so prescribe. Although the L.P.N. administers medications and treatments it is not mentioned specifically as it is in the definition of the professional nurse. Nursing practice for both requires "substantial specialized skill, judgment and knowledge."

The Board of Nursing frequently receives requests from nurses and from others for interpretation of scope of nursing practice. The Nursing Practice Act is a very broad and generally stated law. It contains no specific listing of activities which can be performed legally. Each situation must be considered individually and, therefore, a decision usually cannot be stated immediately but must await discussion by the Board at a scheduled meeting.

The Board always encourages all such requests and asks members of the profession to continue to monitor their own practice in this way. You must be aware that I frequently cannot give you a definite answer to a question regarding scope of practice and there may be a delay until after the next Board Meeting before you will receive that information.

RECENT FINDINGS IN ALZHEIMER'S RESEARCH AND WHAT IT MEANS
MISSOURI ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE AND RELATED DISORDERS TASK FORCE

Alzheimer's Disease (AD) causes structural changes in brain tissue, called tangles and neuritic plaques which are formed by clumps of protein recognizable under the microscope. An important component of these tangles is the protein Amyloid.

Recent advances in AD research have included attention to possible heredity markers on Chromosome 21, both for the familial form of the disease and for productions of Amyloid, the abnormal protein that is deposited in AD brains. The disease probably does not appear unless multiple causative factors occur in the same individual. One of those factors is most likely genetic, but others may relate to physical factors in the environment.

Researchers have found that a small section of Chromosome 21 that contains the gene for the protein Amyloid is duplicated in sporadic cases of AD and in an unusual form of Down's syndrome. The scientists suggest that the excess Amyloid genes may cause overproduction of Amyloid and thus may be involved in the development of AD. However, the presence of excess Amyloid genes does not guarantee the development of the disease. Other factors may play important roles too.

These findings are an important advance following other recent reports of discoveries on Chromosome 21 of a marker for the Amyloid gene and a marker for the gene for the familial (inherited) form of AD (see the February 20, 1987 issue of Science, the February 14, 1987 issue of Lancet, and the February 19, 1987 issue of Nature). The markers and the Amyloid gene were found in the same area of Chromosome 21. Whether the gene for familial AD is the same as the gene for Amyloid is not yet known.

These results are not major breakthroughs, but each piece of information helps to indicate appropriate directions for future research. While these findings are not diagnostic tests or treatments, they will help scientists develop them.

NOTE TO: ADMINISTRATORS, DIRECTORS OF NURSING AND SECURITY OFFICERS

In utilizing the PRN Program as it has been planned, the anonymity of the individual nurse enrolled in that program is maintained and the situation is not immediately reported to the Board of Nursing. If that individual nurse later has a relapse or violates the contract with PRN and is then reported to this Board, the Board is required to act upon information which is sometimes a year or more old. In that period of time administrators, directors of nursing, and security officers may have changed, records may have been misplaced, memories of the incident certainly will have dimmed with the passing of time along with the occurrence of other events thus making it very difficult to obtain information on the situations which caused the institution to initiate disciplinary action. In order for Legislative intent to be fulfilled and the safety of the public to be insured, the Board of Nursing requests that all information be carefully and thoroughly documented, that it be secured carefully, and if the individual in charge of securing that information leaves the employment of the institution, someone else should be thoroughly and carefully informed of the whereabouts of that information and the particulars of the situation so that it is attainable should the necessity arise.

LPN/IV THERAPY CLARIFICATION

I.V. approved Licensed Practical Nurses may add to existing patent intravenous lines, designated premixed medications via I.V. piggyback. This does not allow for mixing solutions or adding a medication to an existing solution.

TORT REFORM LAW

In response to the requirements of the Tort Reform law, the Board of Nursing voted at the last regular meeting to provide inquiring employers with information regarding complaints that are received in the office in compliance with that law. The nature of the information will be:

1. That a complaint has been received.
2. The nature of the complaint.
3. The Board action, if action has been taken at that point.

The Board of Nursing is in the process of promulgating rules pertaining to the Tort Reform Law which will include reporting requirements. Those rules will be considered initially by the Board at the June, 1987 Board Meeting. The rule filing process is rather lengthy, therefore, guidelines will not be available immediately.

More details will be provided later.

REQUESTS FOR BOARD INTERPRETATION/DECISIONS/RECOMMENDATIONS

1. REQUEST: Liability/interpretation of legalities in dispensing medications in a physicians' office.

RESULT (MEETING 03/31/87): Nurses may package, label and dispense but only under the direct supervision of a physician or a pharmacist. If a nurse fills in the label, then the physician must make a final check.

2. REQUEST: Clarification/interpretation of the Nursing Practice Act in regard to administration of medications and treatments, as prescribed by a "person licensed in this state to prescribe such."

RESULT (MEETING 03/31/87): The Nursing Practice Act states that nurses administer medications and treatments as prescribed by a person licensed in this state to prescribe such medication and treatments. To do otherwise is counter to the law. The Board believes that there may be intermediaries but a physician must initiate and validate the order. Nurses must also verify orders from secondaries if they are not certain of their validity and content.

3. REQUEST: Legalities and/or responsibilities of school nurses assisting in a school program and guidelines regarding school nursing.

RESULT (MEETING 03/31/87): Recommends the Association of School Nurses, 720 DeWayne Street, Florissant, Missouri 63031, June Heckel, President, as the best source of information in regard to scope of practice.

4. REQUEST: Intubation by RN-CNM-CRNA.

RESULT (MEETING 01/13/87): This does not fall within the regular basic nursing curriculum but would be within the scope of practice for those nurses who have specialized education preparing them to do so regardless of the specialized role they are filling in their professional practices. Without that educational preparation, they may not perform that function.

5. REQUEST: Installation of Antineoplastic Agents into Body Cavities by an RN/LPN.

RESULT (MEETING 01/13/87): The installation of antineoplastic agents into body cavities is within the scope of practice of an RN/LPN with specialized training. Installation of antineoplastic agents into body cavities may not fall within the curriculum of a generic nursing program and, therefore, specialized training for both levels of nurses may be necessary. Recommend written policies and procedures to be followed.

6. REQUEST: Administration of Dulcolax Suppository.

RESULT (MEETING 01/13/87): Administration of a Dulcolax suppository does not require that the nurse be licensed.

7. REQUEST: Glaucoma Screening by RNs.

RESULT (MEETING 01/13/87): Glaucoma screening with a contact tonometer is within the scope of practice of RNs/LPNs. This procedure does not usually fall within the curriculum of a basic nursing program and, therefore, may require specialized education. Board recommended written policies and procedures to follow.

REQUEST FOR BOARD INTERPRETATION/DECISIONS/RECOMMENDATIONS, cont.

8. REQUEST: Clarification regarding LPNs working in Dialysis Units (LPN/IV rule).

RESULT (MEETING 10/02/86): An LPN who has had the Dialysis course, which is approved by the Department of Health, may initiate dialysis. It is not necessary for that individual to have had a Board approved IV course. The Board does suggest, however, that the LPN sign his/her name as LPN/Dialysis Technician to clarify that individual's position.

9. REQUEST: Clarification on the prefilling of insulin syringes and oral medications.

RESULT (MEETING 10/02/86): The tasks of prefilling insulin syringes and setting up a one (1) or two (2) week supply of oral medications be defined as requiring a nursing license when a nursing assessment is also required.

10. REQUEST: LPNs performing certain functions in a Methadone Maintenance Policy.

RESULT (MEETING 10/02/86): An RN/LPN may not: pour methadone solution from the manufacturer's pint bottle into smaller containers, i.e., one (1) ounce bottles; add several drops of potassium iodide solution, when necessary, to give the dose a bitter taste; add approximately thirty (30) ml of water to the dose; or label the prepared doses with labels prepared by the computer.

COMMENTS FROM CAROL

LICENSURE EXAMINATION FACTS: Pam Groose, Joyce Neaves and I recently had the opportunity to attend a workshop presented by CTB McGraw Hill and the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) which covered many aspects of the licensure examination.

In the last Newsletter, I discussed the appropriate and inappropriate use of scores. In this issue, I would like to share more information from this very excellent program.

CONTRACTS: Each jurisdiction which desires to administer the NCLEX licensure examinations must negotiate a contract with the NCSBN and the testing service. Upon approval of the contract, the jurisdiction is awarded permission to administer the examination as long as terms of the contract are met. Some contractual terms include the security measures that the jurisdiction will implement in order to comply with the required standards. Some of the jurisdictions, like Missouri, utilize Board members, Board staff, and paid proctors to administer the examination. Other states, like Illinois, contract with a testing service, while in others, state statutes and/or regulations require administration of the examination by a state agency other than the Board of Nursing.

CHEATING POLICY: Regardless of who administers the examination for a jurisdiction, each jurisdiction is required, by contract, to have an established examination cheating policy. The examination cheating policy adopted by the Missouri State Board of Nursing is as follows:

CHEATING POLICY, cont.

A candidate suspected of cheating will have his/her examination results held until he/she has the opportunity to meet with the members of the Board at the next regularly scheduled meeting. In the case of a candidate with a passing score, the Board determines whether or not a license will be issued. If the candidate failed, the Board decides whether or not to allow the candidate to retake the next examination.

The testing service provides a service to member Boards whereby examination booklets of candidates who are suspected of cheating can be compared to booklet(s) of the candidate(s) whose answers were being copied. Each table of 35 candidates has one proctor assigned. In addition, the Board hires roving proctors and utilizes Board staff to observe for individuals suspected of cheating. It is the decision of the Chief Examiner, based on observation of the proctors, as well as her own observations, to move a candidate who is suspected of cheating. Commonly observed behaviors in candidates suspected of cheating range from blatant copying from another candidate's booklet, to "paging" with another candidate and making notes of the other candidate's answers to be filled in later. Candidates are cautioned against cheating or behaviors which would make a proctor suspicious of cheating when the General Instructions are given. Candidates usually incur a significant risk in cheating from someone seated nearby, because candidates from the same school are not seated together. Therefore, the knowledge and abilities of the person they are copying from would be unknown. The candidate would probably have a greater chance of success by attempting to answer the questions himself/herself. The Board takes the cheating policy very seriously, and considers the decision to cheat on the licensure examination as the candidate's first nursing decision in his/her nursing career.

CANDIDATES NOT TAKING ALL PARTS OF THE EXAMINATION: For a variety of reasons, ranging from illness to car trouble to forgetting the correct dates of the examination, some candidates do not write the complete examination. In some states, a candidate who misses part of an examination is not allowed to write subsequent parts. In Missouri, candidates are allowed to write all parts of the examination for which they are present. If this occurs, NCSBN and the testing service are notified and those booklets which the candidate did write are scored and a score reported. There are a limited number of tryout questions for future examinations included in every examination which do not influence a candidate's score. Based on the placement of those tryout questions in the booklets, there is the potential for a candidate to achieve a passing score on the examination even if all of the booklets are not completed. Therefore, the Board recently reaffirmed its policy to continue to score the examination even if a candidate has not written all parts. Based on input from a school director, the Board also adopted a policy to notify a school on the school examination report if a candidate did not write all parts of the examination.

ANNUAL LICENSE RENEWAL VERIFICATION SERVICE

This is the second year that we have conducted the renewal verification service for employers. This year we verified 8,251 R.N. renewals from lists submitted by employers and as of May 11, 1987, which is early in the L.P.N. renewal period, we have verified 299 L.P.N. renewals by list. We were only requested to do 675 R.N. verifications by telephone this year on the last day of the renewal period, which is a significant decrease from last

year. We would like to express our appreciation to all employers who participated in the service this year and to the Division of Aging, which allowed us to include our verification lists in one of their mailings.

The office staff has worked extremely hard to make the renewal process go as smoothly as possible. When we are processing around 71,000 licenses the renewal process is impossible to complete without error and is, therefore, constantly being revised and refined for greater efficiency.
